## Make a joyful noise!

## Music speaks louder than words.

~ African proverb about music

This is the third article I am writing about church music from non-European cultures. This one is about African hymns in our ELW hymnbook. There are approximately 15 African hymns in our book and we regularly sing about half of them during our worship services. They are hymns that our congregation has come to like very much.

The African hymns in our hymnbook are not soft, contemplative songs. They are full of movement; they are invigorating. "We Are Marching in the Light" is a great example of a hymn filled with energy and movement. In four relatively short verses, in a highly rhythmic way, we sing about marching, dancing, praying, and singing—all in the light of God.

"Listen, God is Calling" is an example of a song with a leader who starts telling the story. Then the congregation sings a response.

Leader: Jesus gives his mandate Response: share the good news Leader: that he came to save us Response: and set us free.

In this hymn, the leader and congregation work together to share the gospel and to remind us of our mission—sharing the good news. This song subtly reminds us there are leaders, such as pastors, but we are all ministers; we all share in the work of the mission.

"Send Me, Lord" and "Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love" are great examples of hymns that are very unselfconscious. They are hymns that are prayers to God from powerful people who are unafraid of being direct with God. These hymns tell God what we need him to do for us. "Send Me, Lord" lets God know that we want to be sent to share the gospel AND in order to do that we need God to send us where <u>he</u> needs us, lead us in our work for him, and fill us with what we need in order to be good messengers for him.

"Jesus, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love" is another hymn that boldly tells God what we need from him.

Jesu, Jesu, fill us with your love, show us how to serve the neighbors we have from you.

The hymn goes on to tell God why we need him to fill us with his love.

These are the ones we will serve, these are the ones we will love; all these are neighbors to us and you.

Kneel at the feet of our friends, silently washing their feet; this is the way we will live with you.

The creator of this hymn puts it out there. We have a big job to do for Jesus and we can't do it on our own. We need him to lead us, guide us, and keep on filling us with his love so we are up for the tasks he calls us to do.

With thanks that there are many ways through music for us to learn how best to serve the risen Lord. Happy Easter, everyone!

## A Look Back On My Time In Ukraine

As Easter approaches and we look forward to celebrating our Savior Jesus Christ resurrection and the neverending love of our Creator, my thoughts are drawn to my experiences in Ukraine some 22 years ago and the plight of Ukraine's people today.

Back in 2000 I was the President of NTC's Board of Trustees. The school's President Bob Ernst could not make the scheduled trip to Ukraine and asked me to take his place and travel with a delegation of educators, social workers, non-profit directors, a business owner who would share printing expertise and experts in adaptive technologies for the deaf, blind and hearing impaired. This trip was part of a US State Department program. Our goal was to meet with various agencies and educational institutions and offer technology and support. The printer was helping an entrepreneur set up a printing press.

Ukraine regained it's independence after the Soviet Union dissolved in 1991. The Soviets left Ukraine with terrible economic conditions. When preparing for our trip in 2000, we were told to pack toilet paper because it was not available in Ukraine. Often you would find cut up magazines or newspapers where the roll should be. We were told to expect utilities such as water, heat and electricity to be shut off on occasion. Some cities did not yet have infrastructure to support the population. Some mornings a shower was not possible because there was either no water or no natural gas to heat it. Public transportation was limited. Few could afford the luxury of a car. If a Ukrainian had a car, it was a shared asset. Entrepreneurs bought old vans, pulled the seats out and installed benches to expand seating capacity. I suspect the vehicles were often overloaded as we traveled to our appointments. The potholes in the roads far outmatched our roads early in the spring. Most people walked.

Unfortunately I lost track of my host family a number of years ago. Irina, a woman in her mid-twenties acted as my interpreter and my hostess. Irina was well educated as were most of those Ukrainians we met. She worked in marketing for a Polish company. She was fluent in English, Russian, German and her native Ukrainian. I lost track of her when she left Ukraine to take a job in Berlin. Irina's father was a bridge engineer who worked in Moscow and just came home on weekends. Her mother was one of the most entrepreneurial housewives I ever met. She and her sister-inlaw would travel to Poland, purchase household goods that were in short supply such as pot and pans and resell them. Aside from this enterprise, she was working on becoming part of the local government in her city. She was hoping to be elected to a political office, something she could not have done under Soviet rule.

Irina's home became my home base as we traveled the country. Her family lived in a dingy grey Soviet built high-rise with no elevators. The family lived on the fourth floor. The cold, dark concrete stairs that lead to their floor was hazardous especially when carrying a suitcase as the risers on the stairs were uneven and the steps were often cracked and crumbling.

The family was so gracious. I was provided one of the two bedrooms in their small apartment. Irina slept on a small couch in a tiny living room/dining room during my visit. Irina's mother was a wonderful cook. The first evening Russian caviar was the appetizer. And of course, Ukrainian vodka topped off the meal.

We traveled to Ukraine during Lent and I had the opportunity to attend a Palm Sunday service with Irina's family at an Orthodox Catholic Church. Before entering the church, people broke off willow branches from the trees that lined the street in front of the church. These served as palm fronds. The church held only a few seats reserved for the elderly. The concrete floor was well worn. Attendees lit thin candles that were placed on small tables lining the walls. There were hundreds of candles. The Altar was a magnificent depiction of Christ on the Cross in gold leaf. During Soviet occupation, it was illegal to participate in organized church activities. Small groups would worship secrecy in the basements of homes. Artifacts such as this Altar were hidden. We toured a museum dedicated to sharing the religious artifacts and art that had been kept hidden for decades as believers held onto their faith and hope underground.

As we left Ukraine, we were showered with gifts. As Easter approaches, I pull out some of those gifts and remember those I met. There are the Ukrainian eggs, the cross stitched Cross and the beautiful table linens. These gifts have graced my home each Easter since that trip years ago.

It saddens me to think that Ukraine has made incredible progress as an independent, free and increasingly prosperous European country. It is difficult to watch the news and see the carnage. I look back on this trip and wonder what has happened to those I met. I pray that God is protecting them from this awful aggression

Jeff and Delores Kessel would like to donate paint and cover Dennis Wunsch's time to have the choir room painted. A motion was made by Koerten that the council is ok with having Jeff and Delores donate paint and the labor expense of having the choir room painted, second by Lenselink. Motion Carried. Shirley will contact Delores to find out if they have chosen a color. The nominating Committee of 2023 still needs one former church council member. Vicar Pat will make an announcement about that at a church service. Progress articles are due March 25<sup>th</sup>.


