Make a joyful noise!

"Music can lift us out of depression or move us to tears ~ it is a remedy, a tonic, orange juice for the ear. But for many of my neurological patients, music is even more ~ it can provide access, even when no medication can, to movement, to speech, to life. For them, music is not a luxury, but a necessity."

~ Olver Sacks

The above quote is by the physician and author, Oliver Sacks (1933-2015), who was ahead of his time in understanding the value of music, not only for enjoyment, but also for human healing. Dr. Sacks talked about the healing power of music intuitively from his own love of music and from comments made by his patients. Now there is newly emerging brain research that says his assessment of the importance of music for improving the quality of our lives is neurologically correct.

The new research has application for people as memories are being created and also for healing after having experienced trauma. Here are the implications behind the research findings. Music is a very important part of the lives of many, if not most people. It has subtle influences on how we process events in ways that we most likely don't recognize. If we listen to uplifting music, it helps us view the events in our lives in more positive ways and with greater hope than if we listen to very sad, dark music.

Music can help us after the fact as well. Most of us have experienced trauma in our lives. If we listen to uplifting music while we think about the traumas we have experienced, it will help reduce the intensity of the pain we feel when we review our memories of these painful experiences. It won't erase the memories of painful times but can make them easier to bear. The reasoning behind this phenomenon is that every time we visit memories, the memories are changed because we view them through the lens of what is going on in the present.

Which songs of faith can you listen to in order to help you get through hard times or help you heal from past trauma? They may be songs about the power and constant faithfulness of our God. They may be songs that speak about the personal relationship we feel with God. They may be songs that spur us to action to live out our faith in service to others. They may be songs that are associated with past experiences, such as memories of good relationships we have had with important people in our lives. And I'm sure there are as many different ways people find hope and healing in songs of faith as there are people of faith.

MINUTES

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING
December 10th, 2024
Unapproved

PRESENT IN PERSON: Shirley Ecker (President), Charlie Freiberg (Treasurer), Jean Trempe (Secretary), Kay Palmer (Buildings & Grounds Chair), Janet Williams (Life & Growth Chair) Linda Konkel (Evangelism Chair), Sue Koerten (Worship Chair), Jim Lenselink (Stewardship Chair), and Terra Ecker (Children & Youth Chair).

EXCUSED: Jeanette Carlson (Vice President), Charlene Buttner (Church & Society Chair),

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER:

Shirley Ecker called the meeting to order at 6:35 p.m. Devotions were led by Shirley Ecker and focused on gratitude and how the Lord uses people to do great things. Jim Lenselink also shared a poem by Portia Nelson called *There is a Hole in my Sidewalk.* This poem describes the stages of transformation in one's life.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: (Jean Trempe) Review of minutes from November 12, 2024, regular council meeting. A correction was made for the date of the Stewardship Committee meeting. The minutes should reflect a 12-19-2024 date rather than 11-19-24. A motion to accept minutes as corrected was made by Sue Koerten and seconded by Jim Lenselink. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: (Charlie Freiberg) Reviewed financial reports for November 2024. Cash in banks totaled \$82,538, with \$22,620 held as restricted funds. The largest portion of restricted funds is for Blessings that Give Hope of \$13,558. Our long-term loan stands at \$61,287. Contributions are on par for the month. For the eleven months the church's equity stands at \$20,602 (cash – debts) Expenses are in line with prior months. Jean Trempe made a motion to accept the Treasurer's report, and it was seconded by Jim Lenselink. Motion carried.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

(Jeanette Carlson, presented by Charlie Freiberg) Charlie presented the preliminary budget for 2025. This budget will be presented for approval at the Congregational Annual Meeting in January. The budget is comparable to prior years. A change was made on the draft under Maintenance and Repairs

to add additional dollars for furnace inspections. A motion was made by Sue Koerten to approve the preliminary budget as amended. Terra Ecker seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Shirley Ecker)

- The nominations committee has been called to action. The committee consists of Eugene Viegut, Jenni Zaitz and Katie Ecker. The following positions need to be filled:
 - President Jean Trempe has agreed to serve
 - Vice President Frank Koerten has agreed to serve
 - Stewardship Jim Lenselink has agreed to serve again
 - Children and Youth No candidate has been identified as yet
 - Secretary No candidate has been identified as yet
 - Pilgrim's Endowment needs to fill positions for a secretary and possibly one other position currently held by Larry Brandenburg.
 - Members of the nominations committee are needed. Two former council members and two members at larger from the congregation are needed.
- Christian Fellowship Church will end their rental agreement with Pilgrim as of January 31, 2025. We regret their leaving and wish them well as they rejoin the Hmong Alliance Church in Stettin.
- At the October President's meeting, St. Andrews asked if all churches in the area were interested in a meeting to discuss Community Advocacy and opportunities to work together. This meeting pertains to several of our committees and outreach programs. All agreed that it was an opportunity to learn more about what other churches were doing and how we could participate with larger group. Presidents' meetings are usually held the last Tuesday of each month. The next meeting should be on January 28, 2025.
- No update on the internship process.

• Committee reports for the Annual Report are due December 31.

WORSHIP REPORT: (Sue Koerten)

- On December 5 a Day of Prayer was held at Pilgrim. This event was not well attended and will be reviewed for next year.
- December 7 The annual carol sing-a-long was held at Pilgrim. Though not well attended, all who attended enjoyed the event. This event will be reviewed for next year.
- December 15 is an advent service featuring a cantata performed by the choir. A reception will follow.
- Christmas Eve service will be held at 5:00 p.m. with Communion, Pastor Natalie Basset to preside.
- Christmas Day 9:00 a.m. no Communion. Kay Palmer preaching.
- There will be no Thursday evening service on December 26.
- Sunday December 29 9:00 a.m., no Communion. Kathy Robinson preaching.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH: (Terra Ecker) Terra continues to work with the three girls to preform "Jesus Loves Me" during the Christmas cantata on December 15. The girls will attend the Choir's Saturday practice.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS: (Kay Palmer) There are three watch areas for our building; flat roof, skylights, and furnaces.

Brandon Beery of Spec Pro, Inc. inspected the skylights in the lounge area. He provided a report and an estimate to furnish labor and weather coating for the translucent panel system. The estimate totals \$13,402. We can extend the life of the skylights with a cleaning that we can do ourselves. With research we may find a coating that we can apply to further reduce the expense. This will delay the need for replacement.

The furnace in the Narthex had a blockage in a component ahead of the drain line. This caused water to run out onto the floor under the furnace and seep into the Narthex. A portion of the carpet became soaked and the subfloor beneath swelled. Stainless Specialists' service technician inspect-

ed the furnace and also found a capacitor near failing. This furnace was last inspected in November of 2022. The blockage was cleared and the capacitor replaced.

There apparently was a decision made at some point to inspect the furnaces every 3 years. In light of the situation, Kay suggested more frequent inspections to avoid such damage.

While the technician was on site, the furnace that services Fred's office and the lounge area was inspected. The furnace failed the blower test and was taken out of service. It will be replaced on December 11, 2024 at a cost of \$8,300. There are four other identical furnaces that were installed in 1991 that may need replacement depending on inspection results. They will be inspected in the spring. The stewardship committee will be meeting on December 19. The agenda will include plans for a furnace fund drive.

A motion was made by Jim Lenselink to fund the furnace replacement by using funds from the craft sales and chili supper (\$1,225) with the balance coming from general funds. Motion seconded by Terra Ecker. Motion passed.

TRANSITION TASK FORCE: (Kay Palmer) The GPS (Good Shepherd, Pilgrim, St. Stephen) Team is moving! Thanks to Pastor Mode who laid out a process for us. The steps, though not very detailed, gives the group some latitude to create a path that fits the situation, without constraints of a specific timeline.

- Shared Ministry Working on projects together
- Shared Leadership Committee leadership working together
- Shared Governance Combining Church Leadership

Pilgrim with not have a Town Hall Meeting in December as our usually 2nd Sunday of the month conflicts with the Canata performance at St. Stephen.

The next GPS Team meeting will be held on December 17. We will be exploring next steps in building shared ministries.

EVANGELISM (Linda Konkel) The Wisconsin River Valley Conference meeting of the ELCA churches will be held on February 2, 2025.

BLESSINGS THAT GIVE HOPE (Jeff Kessel) It's been a busy November and December for Pilgrim's Blessings That Give Hope (BTGH) ministry. Here are some highlights:

- In November the pantry at Horace Mann received about 230 snack items and 40 sticks of deodorant
- Later in November, over 250 snack items were provided to the John Marshall pantry.
- In November BTGH gave seven \$25.00 gift cards to be used by needy Horace Mann students to buy clothes. The students were accompanied by a staff member while clothes shopping.
- BTGH has provided a total of \$325 to John Marshall and Horace Mann to provide \$5.00 vouchers to 65 students to purchase gifts for family members at each school's winter wish store.

This week items will be delivered to Horace Mann. These include wrapped Holiday gifts for 9 or 10 needy students provided by 9 or 10 Pilgrim families; 17 winter clothing items (flannel pajama pants, fleeces, sweatshirts, snow pants, and socks); one pair of shoes, and assorted snack items brought into the bins in our Narthex.

BTGH provided many items, including protein rich foods such as tuna and canned chicken, to John Marshall's food drive which ended last month. We will be providing similar items to the Food Drive at Horace Mann which ends December 16th.

BTGH will soon be providing an assortment of winter clothing items to John Marshall's pantry. Their need for various items, including waterproof winter gloves, will continue into the new year.

A heartfelt thanks to all those who have donated this fall and early winter. Also, thanks to Hallman Lindsay for their generous donation of \$1,000.00 to the BTGH ministry.

A total of \$143 was received, donated to the furnace fund.

The scrip card program is ongoing. Cards are ordered about every two weeks. Orders can be placed with Fred at the church office or by calling Janet Williams at 715-573-3310. It has been taking about five days to receive cards once ordered. Balance in the scrip cash account is \$4,452 as of November 30.

STEWARDSHIP (Jim Lenselink) A meeting is scheduled for December 19. The agenda includes Faith Inspiration and Opportunity form review, Stewardship plan for 2025 as well as plans for Furnace fund raising.
