Greetings and Happy New Year!

Have you made a resolution for the New Year yet? Research shows that only 9% of Americans who make a resolution for the New Year complete them. 23% of us quit the resolution in the first week, and 43% quit by the end of January.

Although New Year resolutions are good for improving our health while doing it in small increments, we can also set ourselves up for failure if we make those resolutions too big.

We live in a society that keeps everyone busy. This takes away from our down time and rest. As one of those people that keeps herself busy I would like to challenge each of us to not add any additional task to our lists and just zoom out for a little bit by reading a book, having a cup of coffee or tea, taking a nap, reading the Bible, talking with a friend, taking a walk, getting involved in a Bible study, and meditating.

In 2023, several Greater Wausau ELCA Churches are without a pastor (Good Shepherd, Mount Calvary, Immanuel, Bethlehem, and Pilgrim), are in the call process for a new pastor (St. Andrew and First English), currently have a full-time pastor (St. Stephen), and currently have a part-time pastor (St. John's Mosinee). The church council presidents have been meeting monthly since June 2023 to discuss and listen to how each congregation is being affected with this transition process. These congregations are facing the same issue as Pilgrim – no pastor (using supply pastors/lay ministers when they are available), decrease

in attendance, decrease in volunteers, no younger families going to church, etc.

On December 20, Pastor Dara Clifford Associate to the Bishop Director for Evangelical Mission met with Pilgrim's church council. She asked council to discern some tough questions and council will share these questions with the congregation for discussion at an upcoming Special Congregational meeting.

Pilgrim will be busy in 2024 working and praying together about "Where do you see Pilgrim in 3-5 years?" **The congregation is encouraged to attend a special congregational meeting on Sunday January 14, 2024, at 10:15 a.m. with the church council and Pastor Dara Clifford. Save the date and plan to attend this meeting.** It will be an important discussion on the future of Pilgrim Lutheran Church, and your voice is very important as we discuss the future of Pilgrim. If you cannot attend the meeting, please feel free to contact any of the church council members with your questions or concerns and we will present them. Council members are Shirley Ecker, Jeanette Carlson, Charlie Freiberg, Jenni Zaitz, Jim Lenselink, Charlene Buttner, Sue Koerten, Janet Williams, Eugene Viegut, and Terra Ecker.

We will discuss the three options available for the congregation to determine what's best for Pilgrim: shared ministry, merger/consolidation, or Holy Closure. We will discuss each of these options at the congregational meeting on Jan. 14.

“Music simultaneously locates us in time and takes us beyond time—binding us to all who ever sang hymns and all whoever will—our grandparents, neighbors, ancestors in faith and those who will come after us many years from now.”

~ Jordan Miller-Stubbendick

I believe “Of the Father’s Love Begotten” is the oldest hymn in our ELW book, dating to the 300s! It has survived over 17 centuries as a hymn of faith.

*Of the father’s love begotten,
Ere the worlds began to be.
He is Alpha and Omega
He the source, the ending He.
Of the things that are and have been,
And that future years shall see,
Evermore and evermore.*

While it would be possible to study the history of this hymn from an intellectual point of view, as I sing this song or think about this song, I wonder what some of the stories of people are who have sung it over these 17 centuries. I wonder if any of them were in distress when they sang it and if the words in the verse above offered them calm and comfort.

I don’t remember when I was first introduced to this hymn, but I do remember how it came to me as a gift from God when I was going through a very dark time in my life. One night when I was under great stress I went to sleep and during my sleep the words of this song suddenly came to me. It wasn’t a song I had recently played on the piano, it wasn’t a song I had recently sung, it wasn’t a song I had recently heard. It wasn’t a song I had recently thought about. The words were just there. They gave me a sense of hope and peace. God is the Alpha and Omega, the beginning and end of everything. He has been there through all the years that have passed, and he will be there through all the years ahead, not only for me but for everyone.

I wonder if there are other people like me who have been visited by these words when their hearts were weary and in despair. I wonder if there are people who have been in joyful times of their lives when these words appeared. The same words may offer joyous people strength and blessed assurance about the security of their futures in God’s hands. After all, God is there for all, the joyous as well as the distressed.

I wonder what other songs have touched people in very deep ways. I firmly believe music binds us to all who have ever sung hymns and to all who ever will sing them. Even if we don’t know each other’s stories or if our stories are very different, we are bound together. These songs mean something to us.

Blessed be the tie of music that binds our hearts in Christian love.
