LENTEN JOURNEY

Pilgrim, like most churches, is rooted in traditions. Some of these traditions evolve from our Christian, Lutheran ELCA roots, some from the Scandinavian and German roots of our congregation and some from those active members that came before us.

So now that the sparkle and hope of the Advent and Christmas seasons are behind us and the last of the glitter has been swept up, we begin our Lenten journey. We have put away that traditional Christmas Tree, the advent wreath and the beautiful ceramic depiction of Jesus' birth including those three wise men and now enter a season of more somber traditions.

A tradition in many Christian denominations is the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday marking the beginning of Lent. I recall returning to work after attending a noon Ash Wednesday service years ago. One of my coworkers asked me what that black stuff was on my forehead. For those who have not experienced this tradition, it probably looked pretty strange. Those ashes of burnt palm fronds on my forehead represented mourning and repentance and are a reminder of our mortality in this world. It is a call to repentance and sacrifice. It serves as a reminder of Jesus' suffering and death for our sake. This tradition began as early as the 8th century in the Christian church by some accounts, as a time of repentance, fasting and sacrifice. Here we are centuries later, honoring those same traditions.

Some traditions can and do change over time. Some traditions change for very good reasons. You won't see any candles lit on Christmas trees today for example. As we enter the Lenten Season, some of our traditions will change. Pilgrim's traditions are impacted by efforts to work closely with St. Stephen as we work toward merger. However, those traditions will not disappear. Soup Supper on Wednesdays will be lunches at Pilgrim this year and include a more casual service during lunch. The Holden Evening Prayer service continues on, but it will be part of a Thursday evening service at Pilgrim during Lent. Sunday Worship Services during Lent will be held jointly at St. Stephen. It is a time to get to know each other on a deeper, more spiritual level as we experience the Lenten season together.

I encourage you all to take advantage of the services and times of fellowship offered during the Lenten Season. We will find our way out of the Wilderness and form new traditions going forward. Grief will give way to joy as we look forward to Jesus' resurrection and our salvation. Easter Sunday is around the corner.

WORSHIP SCHEDULE

THRU EASTER

Combined worship services with St. Stephen began in January this year and will continue in February, March, and beyond.

Sunday, February 1st will be a shared service held at Pilgrim.

Sunday, February 8th will be a regularly scheduled service at Pilgrim.

Beginning February 15th and during Lent, all Sunday worship services will be held at St. Stephen. There will be no Sunday services at Pilgrim on these Sundays.

All midweek Lenten services will be held at Pilgrim. Noon Lenten lunches (with soup) will be held in Fellowship Hall on Wednesdays. Plus, Lenten Holden Evening Prayer services will be held in the sanctuary on Thursday evenings at 6:30 p.m. Please look at the sign-up sheet on the information table in the lounge for opportunities to contribute to the Wednesday luncheons. There will be no soup suppers on Thursday evenings.

Palm Sunday will be a shared service with St. Stephen, held at Pilgrim, when there will also be a baptism.

This year, we will again have these three combined services: Ash Wednesday at 6:30 p.m. (Pilgrim); Maundy Thursday at 6:30 p.m. (Good Shepherd); and Good Friday 12:00 noon and 6:30 p.m. (St. Stephen).

Individual Easter services will be held at all three churches. And, so that the choir can sing at both St. Stephen and Pilgrim, Pilgrim's service will be held at 8:30 a.m. and St. Stephen's at 10:30 a.m.



Ash Wednesday will be a combined service of Pilgrim, St. Stephen, and Good Shepherd. The anthem that the choir will sing for that special service is “Give Me Jesus”. I was surprised to learn a few things about this beautiful hymn. It began as a Slave song and the first line in it, “In the morning when I rise” refers to going to heaven, not getting up to face a new day as I had thought. When you read the words of the song, read them through the lens of awakening in heaven as a free person. The first words of the second verse, “Dark midnight was my cry” most likely refers to the darkness of living a life as a slave, as property, as a tool of labor. The words of these two verses speak of both sorrow and hope.

Each verse repeats the first line of that verse three times and then ends with the words “give me Jesus”

*In the morning when I rise
Dark midnight was my cry
Just about the break of day
Oh, when I come to die
And when I want to sing
Refrain: Give my Jesus, give me Jesus,
You may have all the rest, give me Jesus.*

Lent is a time of self-examination, of atoning for our shortcomings, of re-setting our priorities on the things that are truly important. The song is a powerful prayer that directs us to think on spiritual treasures over worldly comfort; “you may have all the rest, give me Jesus”.

Is this song a relic from an earlier time that we can understand only as a museum piece? The answer is a decided NO! The words transcend time. Psychologist and musician Arthur Jones has eloquently stated, “Spirituals are ‘available to all persons who are prepared to open themselves to the unsettling healing power that inhabits these marvelous songs of life.’ They come out of slavery, indisputably ‘deeply meaningful, human experiences, relevant not only to the specific circumstances of slavery but also to women and men struggling with issues of justice, freedom, and spiritual wholeness in all times and places’— ‘the spirituals [are] sources of wisdom and guidance in addressing current societal and psychological issues.’”

LWR PERSONAL CARE KITS—LENTEN COLLECTION

This year, during Lent, we will collect items for personal care kits for Lutheran World Relief. Cleanliness may not actually be next to godliness, but it certainly helps a person feel more human. When families find their homes destroyed, or must flee for their safety, soap and a towel rarely make the cut for what they can carry. Arriving in a refugee camp or other place of safety, they are scared, vulnerable, and dirty from the travel. The simple items included in a Personal Care Kit provide much-needed self-care, critical germ fighting, and the chance to regain dignity amidst situations of fear and uncertainty. Items needed are:

Metal nail clippers
(attached file optional)



Two or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz.
(any brand, in original wrapping; no mini or hotel size bars)



Adult-size toothbrushes in their original packaging
(toothbrush multi-packs are acceptable)



Sturdy combs
(no picks or fine-toothed combs.)



Lightweight cotton or cotton blend bath-size towel
(20" x 40" to 52" x 27"), dark color recommended.

HELP NEEDED FOR OUR NEW NEIGHBORS

New Beginnings for Refugees assists refugees as they put down roots in the Wausau area. The organization gathers donations and provides household goods for each family when they first arrive, and a personal needs pantry to supplement their first two years. New Beginnings for Refugees began with the support of a grant from the BA & Ester Greenheck Foundation in 2023 and is listed as an agency by United Way of Marathon County.

Volunteers teach English and cultural classes to adult refugees to prepare them for employment, community interaction and involvement. During class, childcare is provided to help prepare refugee children to flourish in school.

Local volunteers are needed to welcome and engage our new neighbors in a variety of roles, including tutoring English, childcare during English classes, stocking and staffing our personal needs pantry. There is a critical need for volunteers willing to befriend new families in our neighborhoods, schools, and community groups. Monetary donations are accepted online. Donations of materials to support the refugees are welcome.



MINUTES
REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING
 January 13, 2026
 Not Yet Approved

PRESENT IN PERSON: Jean Trempe (President), Frank Koerten (Vice President), Linda Konkel (Secretary), Charlie Freiberg (Treasurer), Jim Lenselink (Building & Grounds Chair), Charlene Buttner (Church & Society Chair).

ABSENT: Janet Williams (Life & Growth Chair), Sue Koerten (Worship Chair)

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: Jean Trempe called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Charlene Buttner led the devotion based on Jeremiah 1:4-10. The Lord said, "Do not say, I am only a boy." For everything there is a season, and sometimes the season is to receive the gifts of others.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: (Linda Konkel) Motion by Frank Koerten and second by Charlene Buttner to accept the December 9, 2025, meeting minutes. Motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT: (Charlie Freiberg) Cash in the banks total \$84,765 with \$15,219 held in restricted funds. Again, the largest portion of the restricted funds are Blessings that Give Hope. Our long-term debt stands at \$52,369. A reminder that the church real estate is not included on the balance sheet.

Motion by Jim Lenselink and seconded by Frank Koerten to accept the Treasurer's Report. Motion passed.

The audit committee will consist of Jeanette Carlson and Karen Larson. Charlie will contact them and remind them that the audit must take place prior to the annual meeting on January 25, 2026.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Jean Trempe) Jean reported that the Merger Workgroups have begun meeting.

The St. Stephen/Pilgrim Building & Grounds group met and did a walk-through of the building making a list of things that will need to be done once the building is vacant. Examples of these items include shoveling, mowing, checking furnaces, plumbing, window maintenance, checking for roof issues to name a few. A suggestion was made to number the entrances and exits to better monitor the building. It was also suggested that we contact the insurance company to see if any changes need to be made to our policy once the building is not occupied on a regular basis. Security ideas such as a Ring security system and extra police patrols may need to be worked out also.

The St. Stephen/Pilgrim Prayer group has met a couple of times. They are getting to know each other and are making plans for book studies. St. Stephen does not have a prayer circle like Pilgrim does, but the group would like to continue that activity in the future. They are also looking at doing a "historical timeline" for both churches. So, they will be looking for some information on the two churches' histories.

The St. Stephen/Pilgrim Outreach group is making a list of what each church is currently doing and then they will see where we can combine efforts and begin to start working together.

The St. Stephen/Pilgrim Constitution group has completed their work; however, a separate group will make recommendations for the bylaws. Pilgrim and St. Stephen operate a bit differently today. One decision is the make-up of the council and terms of council positions, for example. Bylaws can be approved by the congregations at special congregational meetings

and are incorporated into the Constitution following the ELCA's model constitution. The Constitution can only be approved by the congregation at an annual meeting. Approval of the entire document will take place after the merger as the new congregation. A resource has been provided by the Synod to work with us through the process of creating the new documents and timing of approvals. The Synod will need to give their final approval after the new congregation approves the document. In the meantime, the new, merged church will operate under St. Stephen's current constitution.

The St. Stephen/Pilgrim Long Term Use group meeting was cancelled due to the weather last week. It is rescheduled for January 15.

The St. Stephen/Pilgrim Communication group has also met for the first time. They are off to a good start and are going to work hard to keep both congregations in the loop on all the changes that are taking place.

The Southeast Side Neighborhood group would like to use Fellowship Hall again this winter for Family Bingo nights once a month. They have requested the use of our building on January 22, February 12, and March 5. Motion by Charlene Buttner and second by Frank Koerten to approve the request. Motion carried.

Dan, Erika, and Klaire Staffel have requested membership to Pilgrim. Motion by Jim Lenselink and second by Charlene Buttner to accept the Staffel family for membership. Motion carried. Jean Trempe will contact them with some dates that will work in February for their welcome service. A coffee-hour reception will be organized in their honor.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Frank Koerten) No report.
