Dancing with God

A few years ago, Pilgrim's Mission Possible Team (Seeds for Growth) studied a book written by Pastor Dwight Zscheile "The Agile Church: Spirit-Led Innovation in an Uncertain Age." The book addresses issues that face Pilgrim Lutheran Church each day, the uncertainty of the future. Especially over the past few months, I am reminded that we are on God's timeline. The author of this book creates this image for me. The image is that of a ballroom dance with God, encouraging us "To move with quick easy grace, to be led by God in a dance."

We have been "dancing" for a while now. Here we are, seven or so years after our beloved Pastor retired. Little did we know that we would be the first of 7 local ELCA churches to be without a Pastor. Since then, we've helped two individuals succeed in becoming Pastors. As a congregation we have managed to survive, but perhaps not thrive. We have a few new members, a few young families, but fewer volunteers and most of us are grey haired.

Now we are faced with decisions that will cause upheaval in our tranquil church world no matter what decisions are made. Do we continue on without a permanent pastor? Is it possible to find another pastoral intern? Do we consolidate with other local churches

and possibly leave our beautiful building? Is it possible to share a pastor and stay at Pilgrim? If we consolidate, will we have a pastor? If we consolidate, do we create a K-mart and Sears scenario where consolidation did not solve their woes. Unfortunately, neither entity exists today. How do we retain existing members and attract new members while we figure this out? Are there options that have not yet presented themselves? There are no certainties except that somehow, we continue to serve God in the midst of these concerns.

Churches don't eventually die as some have suggested. Luther's church has survived for over 500 years now. I have been blessed to have visited Germany on a couple of occasions and seen some of those century old churches which still provide worship and serve their communities. One small rural church we visited held both Lutheran and Catholic services. Creative solutions are possible. Years ago in Ukraine I attended a Palm Sunday service at an Orthodox Catholic church that had been boarded up during Soviet occupation, its ornate altar hidden in a basement. Through all of the tumult, the church survived.

I was reminded by a pastor that the name of the affiliation or church (brand) has no bearing on our mission. We are not a Burger King or McDonalds. We

are all here working together to share the love, hope and saving power of the God that we put our trust and faith in.

As Christians, most of us believe that our lives depend upon the connection to the Church, our God and our Savior. Our faith in the death and Resurrection of our Savior Jesus Christ makes a life and death difference to us. For this is what saves us. Jesus died for our sins.

As the Easter Season comes to its crescendo, we are reminded of the importance of sharing the gospel, the good news that Christ has died for our sins and lives, that as believers, we will live. Regardless of our path, we will continue to give those outside of the Church the joy of knowing that they are saved if only they believe. We will continue to share the joy of serving others by helping those in need. God's Will should be our driving force. He will keep us from harm, but also challenge us to move forward in different ways that are not always comfortable. Perhaps we need to learn a new dance step. Prayer is our most powerful tool in our tool kit. We are so blessed to have willing volunteers and a prayerful congregation. There is a great sense of God's presence among us.

Shall we dance?

ELCA World Hunger



After Ram Kala's husband died, she wasn't sure how she would support her four children through traditional farming. "I worked hard," she says, "but the land only produced enough for four months."

Then, a few years ago, Ram Kala connected with the Ekikrit Bikash Manch (EBM) organization. EBM partners with the United Mission to Nepal, which is supported by gifts to ELCA World Hunger. Through EBM's food security program Ram Kala received training in home garden management, financial literacy, climate change adaptation, and more. Eventually she was selected to receive four goats and training on how to keep them.

Ram Kala's goats, along with the vegetables from her home garden, have increased her income and helped her create a stable future for her children. She has been able to pay for their schooling and support her daughter's work towards a bachelor's degree.

MEETING CALLED TO OR-DER: Shirley Ecker called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Devotions were lead by Jean Trempe. The devotion was written by Pastor Paulette and focused on "working together to proclaim the love and saving power of the Triune God in this particular place, at this particular

(Jean Trempe) Review of minutes from February 13, 2024 regular council meeting. A motion to accept minutes by Charlie Freiberg and seconded by Jeanette Carlson. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

(Charlie Freiberg) Reviewed financial reports for February 2024. For the month, Income was short of budget by \$124. Expenses were more than budgeted by \$80. For the year there is an excess of income over expenses of \$132. Cash in banks totals \$67,030. Of that, \$27,851 are restricted funds. Long term debt stands at \$67,219. Offerings are stable. Charlene Buttner made a

motion to accept the Treasurer's report and it was seconded by Jim Lenselink. Motion carried.

VICE PRESIDENT'S RE-PORT: (Jeanette Carlson) No Report

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

(Shirley Ecker) The annual rummage sale will be held in conjunction with the Southeast Side neighborhood wide sale planned for June 20-22. An idea was brought forward to hold a bag sale, a grocery bag full of goods for \$5.00 rather than marking individual items. Larger items would still need to be priced. There will also be a bake sale. More details will follow as plans are finalized. Sign up sheets will be available soon. Volunteers will be needed to help plan and on the day(s) of the sale.

Task Force Update: A Townhall meeting was held after the church service on March 10. The task force shared the results of an informational meeting with Pastor Gjerde from Zion Lutheran. He was invited to Pilgrim to share information about the LCMC (Lutheran Churches in Mission for Christ) churches and how their structure differs from the ELCA. There is a summary that was provided by Pastor Gjerde available. The LCMC is an association of churches with 900 congregations worldwide. This church sprung out of the ELCA back in 2001. Rather than a synodical structure, the churches are independent, able to write their own bylaws and hire pastors directly. Each church has their own mission with a focus on serving their local community. There are four churches in our area that have moved to the LCMC. The Townhall meeting was videotaped and is available to the congregation. More information is needed before the Task

Force would suggest the option of moving away from the ELCA. The council raised concerns about differences in doctrine. qualifications of pastors and lack of support that our Synod now provides. Synod staff have called a meeting of council members and task force members for the three churches interested in exploring consolidation. The meeting will be held on March 16 beginning at 8:30 a.m. at Good Sheperd in Riverview. An agenda has not been shared as of the time of our council meeting. We hope to learn more about our options.

President's Meeting Update: Presidents' meeting will be held next week at Emmanual.

WORSHIP REPORT: (Sue Koerten) Attendance for soup suppers and Lenten services was low, with 12 and 13 people for the first two weeks. The committee will discuss options for Lenten services and soup supper for next year, perhaps a service at noon, including lunch. Our next meeting will be after Easter.

BUILDINGS AND

GROUNDS: (Kay Palmer) All is well with the Building and Ground Committee. We have had a mild winter. so far, there has been little snow to be handled. There were no major maintenance or repairs in the past month. Thank you to Randy Ecker for patching the broken out asphalt leading to the sidewalk for Fellowship Hall. It was brought up that our lawn tractor is failing and needs to be replaced.

EVANGELISM: (Linda Konkel) Linda indicated that she needs committee members and some direction. Charlene offered to work with Linda and share

It was noted that information is posted on the Southeast Side Facebook page regarding collection efforts. Members of the Southeast Side community drop off items as well as our congregation. The balance in the Food Program's restricted checking account is \$18,373 as of the end of February. These funds are used periodically and consist of donations as well as the remaining grant dollars from the ELCA.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY:

We are collecting bath size bars of soap (8-9 oz), metal nail clippers, sturdy combs, light weight bath-sized towels (20" x 40" to 52" x 27") and adult-sized toothbrushes in original packaging. LIFE AND GROWTH: (Janet Williams) Lenten soup suppers started on Wednesday, February 14 and will continue every Wednesday until March 20. Attendance has been low, averaging about 12 people. Thanks to Jeff & Delores Kessel for making the soup for the first three Wednesday's. Thanks to all who helped set up, clean up and provided food. There are two Wednesdays left. Thanks to Karen Larson for

agreeing to make soup this Wednesday, March 13; thanks to Shirley & Katie Ecker for agreeing to make soup on March 20. Additional thanks to Jean Trempe for taking over for me while I am gone.

The Election Day bake sale was held at the Health Care Center on February 20. We received a lot of thank you's and appreciation from the voters! Total earned was \$520.10. Thanks to Jean Trempe, Linda Konkel and Kathi Kunze for helping mark the baked good. Additional thanks to Jean Trempe for helping me setup at the Health Care Center. Thanks to our sellers who helped me during the day: Kathi Kunze, Jean Trempe, Ramona Schmitz, June Champagne, Debbie Glascock and Cathy Gottschalk. Thanks to all the Pilgrim bakers who provided treats to sell.

The April Election Day bake sale will be held on Tuesday, April 2. Cathy Gottschalk will be in charge of this event as I will be out of town. Signup sheet is on the library table.

A motion was made by Charlene to use \$100 of bake sale money for the Care Kits. Charlie seconded the motion. Motion carried. Charlie made a motion to set up a restricted lawn tractor fund. Linda seconded the motion. Motion carried. A motion was made by Jeanette and seconded by Terra to move the remaining bake sale proceeds of \$420.10 into the new lawn tractor fund. Motion passed.

A total of \$141 was collected from the first two soup suppers. A motion was made by Jim and seconded by Terra to move these funds of \$141 into the new lawn tractor fund. Motion carried. The lawn tractor fund will have \$561 to start. It was suggested

that additional fund raising will be necessary to acquire a new lawn tractor.

The scrip card program is ongoing. Cards are ordered about every two weeks. Orders can be placed with Fred at the church office or Janet Williams (715) 573-3310. It has been taking about five days to receive the cards once the order has been placed. Current cash balance is \$7,055.

Committee chairs are strongly encouraged to reach out to those interested in volunteering as well as those who did not complete the survey as they go about their various projects.
