## HAPPY ANNIVERSARY TO THE LUTHERAN CHURCH AND THE WINDS OF CHANGE

October marks the anniversary of the birth of the Lutheran Church culminating on the last Sunday of the month, Reformation Sunday. Martin Luther, a renegade German monk of the Roman Catholic Church is credited with the Church's foundation. Luther's goal was to turn the church back to the teaching of the bible. The most important part of the goal was to proclaim the truth that we are saved not by our own efforts but by God's grace through faith in Jesus Christ, our Savior. When you consider that in Luther's time, the printing press was a new invention and literacy was limited to a few scholars mostly in the church, the Reformation was a miracle. Few church goers could read, thus relied on what they were told by the Catholic Church. The presence of God most certainly led Luther on his mission to challenge the religious norms of the day.

On October 31, 1517, Luther posted the first of the 95 theses on the village's bulletin board, the Wittenberg's Castle Church door. "When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, 'Repent' (Matthew

4:17), he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance." Believers repent and receive forgiveness that was purchased not with silver or gold, but with the precious blood of Christ" (1Peter 1:19). And thus the Reformation began.

Luther is credited with bringing the Word to the masses. He painstakingly translated the bible into the German language which thanks to the relatively new invention, the printing press, it became a best seller. The bible in its various versions remains on the best seller list worldwide. Luther's Small Catechism continues to be used today not only by Lutherans but in all Christian churches. Luther's writings totaled more than 100 volumes, well over 60,000 pages. As we celebrate the founding of the Lutheran Church, contemplate how one man could change the world. Luther would have said he did nothing, it was the Word of God, God's Will. His stance was that he was just an instrument of God.

Today, there are about 30 different Lutheran denominations in the

United States. The Evangelical Church of American is the largest of the Lutheran churches in the U.S., of which we are part. The ELCA has struggled in recent years in the U.S. Since its inception in 1987 membership has declined by 2.4 million members. Membership is estimated at 2.8 million members today, nearly a 50% decline. The ELCA has gone from 11,000 churches in the U.S. to 8,000. This is according to a September 10, 2025 article written by Pastor Tomas Jacobson entitled "Lutheran Denominations: Guide to America's Top 10 Lutheran Churches. Our congregation's membership plight reflects a small portion of continued declines in membership of the ELCA.

In the age of fewer ELCA Lutherans in the U.S. and reflecting on Luther's teachings, how can we impact these numbers and have a positive impact on our community, country and world? Our nation has been plagued with violence and divisiveness. From school shootings to political assassinations and wars that rage in Ukraine and the Middle East, to increasing homelessness and drug addiction in Wausau. If, as Luther believed, we are all instruments of God, how do we impact these challenges? How can we focus our church and

the ELCA on the things that matter, that can make a difference in our community and world? Can we be instruments of God and fan the winds of change?

To mark this anniversary of the Lutheran Church, let's pick up our bibles and read the Word and of God. Seek guidance in the Word. Come to Church and feel the Spirit among us. Share the peace of God's grace. Get engaged in a bible study. Pick up a Small Catechism. Volunteer to help those in need. Comfort those in times of trouble. Watch a Christian podcast. Teach our children about their faith. Pray that our political leaders work together to make right and just decisions. Write to our Congressman or Senator. Pray for our youth, the next generations, that they may come to value the sanctity of human life. Pray for leaders of our Synod and Churchwide ELCA that they lead the church to focus on those things that matter and guide the Church to work toward bringing others to know Jesus and his life-saving grace, sharing Luther's teachings. Pray without Ceasing! Thank God for all of our blessings.

Luther's writings have survived for these 508 years. As Luther said "The Word is Everything." At Pilgrim's September 21 congregational meeting, the congregation voted to move forward with

merger conversations with St. Stephen. We have a unique opportunity for renewal. We can fan the winds of change as Luther did. There is a joint congregational worship service and retreat planned for October 26 at St Stephen beginning at 9:00 a.m. It is aimed at creating a new vision and mission for a new combined church. As we look at reviving these two congregations, how can we weave Luther's teachings into the conversation? How can we join forces to become better instruments of God? Each of us can be part of creating a new way forward in service to God. Are you willing to answer the call? God will guide us along our next steps on our Pilgrim journey, just as he did Luther.

- Financial Issues Assets, Liabilities and Budgeting
- Policies and Practices
- Stewardship Practices
- Ministry to include worship, education, evangelism and outreach
- Celebration Artifacts and historical items, plan for Celebration Sunday to mark the completion of merger

## Make a joyful noise!

"Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?"

One of my favorite gospel songs is "His Eye Is on the Sparrow" written in 1905 by Cavilla Martin. I like it for many reasons. My mother loved birds and every time I think of this song I think of my mother. I love its message. "His eye is on the sparrow, and I know he watches me."


#### Refrain:

#### **MINUTES**

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING September 9, 2025 Not Yet Approved

PRESENT IN PERSON: Jean Trempe (President), Frank Koerten (Vice President), Charlie Freiberg (Treasurer), Sue Koerten (Worship Chair), Jim Lenselink (Buildings & Grounds Chair), and Charlene Buttner (Church and Society/Social Concerns Chair)

**EXCUSED:** Janet Williams (Life & Growth Chair) and Linda Konkel (Secretary)

**GUEST: Delores** Kessel

MEETING CALLED TO OR-DER: Jean Trempe called the meeting to order at 6:35 p.m. Devotions were led by Jean Trempe with a reading from <u>Jesus is Calling</u> by Sarah Young, entitled "Walk with Me Along Paths of

Trust."

#### PRESENTATION – SANCTI-FIED ART (Delores Kessel)

Delores provided the Council with information about Sanctified Art which is a resource for spoken liturgy and sermon guides for worship services. St. Stephen uses this resource. Pilgrim currently uses Sundays and Seasons. The packet would include templates for the church calendar from Advent to Epiphany. The resource would need to be provided to supply Pastors and Lay Ministers for their use in worship preparation. The cost is approximately \$200.00. After discussion, the Council opted to delegate the decision to the Worship Committee.

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT:

(Jean Trempe) Review of the minutes of August 12, 2025, regular council meeting. One correction for spelling was made. A motion to accept the minutes as corrected was made by Frank

Koerten and seconded by Jim Lenselink. Motion carried

#### TREASURER'S REPORT:

(Charlie Freiberg) Reviewed financial reports for August 2025. Cash in banks totaled \$83,700. with \$29.928 held in restricted funds. The largest portion of restricted funds is for Blessings that Give Hope of \$11,371. Our longterm loan stands at \$55,160. Equity stands at \$27,993 excluding real estate. Contributions for the month were lower than usual in part because the last Sunday of the month's deposit was held until September. Expenses are in line with prior months. A motion to accept the treasurer's report was made by Charlene Buttner and seconded by Sue Koerten. Motion carried.

Charlie also noted that the invoice for the two furnaces that were replaced was paid in September leaving \$1,480 in the furnace fund once the invoice was paid.

The council discussed whether the Sunday School and Evangelism cash accounts should remain restricted or be included in the General Cash fund. A motion was made by Sue Koerten and seconded by Jim Lenselink to move the Sunday School and Evangelism cash accounts to the General Fund. Motion carried.

## **PRESIDENT'S REPORT:** (Jean Trempe)

- Fred has asked that his work week continue at three days. He would plan to use up his remaining accrued time off which will last until March of 2026. The council can reassess the agreement in January or March as needed. A motion was made by Frank Koerten and seconded by Charlie Freiberg to accept Fred's recommendation. Motion Carried.
  - Fred provided a note thanking the council and task force for

- recommending him for a position with St. Stephen. St. Stephen will have an opening in their office beginning in October. Fred met with St. Stephen's Treasurer, Jim VonRueden resulting in an employment offer and a tentative start date of January 1, 2026. Jim will handle St. Stephen's needs until Fred starts. Fred will continue to support Pilgrim, until a merger takes place. If a merger does not take place, Fred will continue on with Pilgrim until the situation changes. The council expressed thankfulness for being able to support Fred in ensuring future employment.
- The council reviewed the agenda for the Special Congregational Meeting to be held on September 21. It contains two resolutions, one to allow the transition team to move forward with merger discussions with St. Stephen. The second resolution allows for the extension of council member terms for two members, (Sue and Charlie), beyond January 2026 to allow for continuity during merger discussions should the motion to continue merger discussion be approved. A motion to approve the agenda was made by Sue Koerten and seconded by Charlie Freiberg. Motion Carried.
- An updated member list was provided to the council. Jean asked that prior to the Special Meeting of the Congregation that council members reach out to members to encourage their participation. Confirmed (voting) members may attend the meeting in person or online via Zoom after the worship service on September 21. An email reminder will also go out including the approved

- agenda and instructions for those who plan to attend online. To pass the resolutions, a 2/3 majority of 20 eligible members is required.
- Transition Team update: The GPS (Good Shepherd, Pilgrim, and St. Stephen) transition group has been disbanded. Pilgrim was scheduled to host a final meeting on September 30, however Pilgrim's transition team elected not to host the meeting. Good Shepherd has planned a meeting including a worship service and meal for the same date to be held at St. Andrew. Pilgrim's transition team members are invited to attend as they choose. If the congregational meeting approves moving forward with merger, Pilgrim and St. Stephen's transition teams will begin work toward potential merger.
- Shirley and Katie Ecker have been appointed as Pilgrim's representatives to the Wisconsin Valley Conference in the Konkel's absence. The meeting is in October.

#### VICE PRESIDENT'S RE-PORT: (Frank Koerten)

Frank planned to attend the President's meeting in Jean's absence; however the meeting was cancelled by hosting congregation, Good Shepherd.

## **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS REPORT:** (Jim Lenselink)

- The installation of two new furnaces is complete.
- Thank you to Steve and Linda Konkel for replacing the downspouts on the carport.
   Vandals damaged the spouts and some of the troughs a couple of weeks ago.

- In the choir loft, some of the plaster needs repair. Jim is collecting quotes. It is expected to cost approximately \$500.00
- The council discussed some options for the memorial garden and the community gardens. Jim has reached out to someone, however there is no proposal at this point.

- Christmas choral music has been chosen for the Christmas choral programs at Pilgrim and St Stephen, "The Angels Sang Glory." St. Stephen's program is planned for December 14. Pilgrim's program date is either December 7 or 21.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY RE-PORT: (Charlene Buttner) We are completing the LWR kits for the Ingathering on October 4. Clothing donations were made to the United Way Community Closet.

**LIFE AND GROWTH RE- PORT:** (Janet Williams)-No report

The next council meeting will be Tuesday, October 8, at 6:30 p.m. with devotions lead by Linda Konkel.
