Dear Siblings in Christ,

Lately, I have been listening to a series of books by Octavia Butler called "The Parable of the Sower" and "The Parable of the Talents." The main character Lauren is the daughter of a Baptist minister in the Los Angeles area in the 2020s. These books, written in the 1990s, are considered to be science fiction. For Lauren, God is not a person, a deity, or a supernatural entity. God is more abstract than that. To her, "God is change." She writes, "The one irresistible force in the universe is Change. Everything in the universe Changes. Every living thing, every bit of matter, all the energy in the universe Changes in some way. All that you touch you Change. All that you Change Changes you. The only lasting truth is Change. God Is Change."



While Change is not my personal image of God, change is a constant in our lives. The Oxford dictionary defines change as "the act or instance of making or becoming different." It is both a verb and a noun. What we often don't talk about is the two parts of change. The first part is grief and the second part is new growth. When change happens, we lose something. Maybe it is part of our identity. When our homes, jobs, or families change, we grieve over what once was. As we enter a new school year, families are grieving and excited for students entering college and kindergarten. Our tears at weddings this summer were a mix of grief and excitement too.

For many of us, we go to church because it feels like the one constant in our world. With Vicar Pat accepting a call to congregations in the LaCrosse area, it is another change. Exploring shared and collaborative ministry is another change. The questions about worship times, styles, and what does shared ministry mean and what does it look like can create anxiety and grief. Yes, even at Pilgrim and in the larger Church, things are changing.

The Apostle Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 5:17, "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; look, new things have come into being!" Hope-filled words! Even amidst our grief and uncertainty about the future, Jesus is with us and doing amazing things. Jesus, the second person of the Trinity, continues to create. What began in the creation story continues even in our lives today. Jesus with his own life showed us that even in death, there is resurrection! There is new growth and new creation.

Amazing things are happening in the Wausau area. Jesus is creating all things new. Even when we are anxious or grieving over the changes that are happening in the congregation, Church, community and country, the Holy Spirit is still at work. We might not know or understand where we are heading, but we can be confident that Jesus is walking with us.

Mirabai Starr, spiritual director, author, and a mother who has experienced intense and tragic grief, states that it is important to recognize our grief and that it's okay to grieve (we all have our own timetable when it comes to grief). The problem comes when grief keeps us stuck, distant from others, and when the anger from our grief causes harm to others. She also says that there is another side to grief. Grief can move us from being passive to being active. It can also move us from stuckness to risk taking. Out of grief can come new growth.

As Pilgrim's Transition Facilitator, I am your coach and consultant during this time of change and creative growth. I primarily walk alongside your staff and lay leadership in exploring and discerning where God is calling Pilgrim. It does take all of us to be the hands and feet of Jesus. The ministry of Jesus at Pilgrim and in Wausau needs everyone's energy, passion, and financial support. I challenge you to find at least three to four hours a month outside of worship to be involved in Pilgrim's ministry and mission. Where can you serve?

"For Everyone Born" was written by New Zealand hymn writer, Shirley Erena Murray in the late 1990s. The themes in the song are as timely today as they were when she wrote it. All people deserve an environment that provides them a place at the table, and one that is safe, both from assault and from damaged or destroyed natural resources. Everyone deserves clean water and bread. People of all ages deserve "a place at the table, a voice to be heard, a part in the song." Everyone deserves a place "simply to be," a place where they are free to "work, to speak out" and "the right to be free."

Ms. Murray said about her hymn writing, "I appreciate and relate to precise and clean language as opposed to flowery and fudgy. I am, in knitting parlance, a plain rather than purl sort of writer. I like language that gives a jolt of reality." Certainly the song "For Everyone Born" is plain spoken, it is heartfelt, it offers all of us huge challenges to create the kind of world she wrote about, and it gives us a jolt of reality.

Our choir chose this song for Vicar Pat's farewell Sunday with us because it captures his theology: Welcome and include everyone. Provide everyone with a place where they are safe. Allow everyone a voice where they can speak out. Be kind and show Christian love to all. Encourage each other's skills and their opportunities to respectfully serve others. Stumble, as we will, and then get up and try again.

In the future when I hear this song, I will remember Vicar Pat's ministry among us. I will also hear it with new ears. The world is constantly changing. As long as we are alive, we will be challenged with how to welcome and include others, how to provide safety for them, how to find ways to let their voices be heard and to make a difference, and how to show lovingkindness.

Blessings That Give Hope: A New Year—A New Way to Serve

It has come to our attention during the 2022-2023 school year that providing weekend food bags was not what was needed most anymore for John Marshall families. Therefore, we met with the social worker and the new principal and talked through what would be most beneficial for them and the best way to use the resources we have to provide what they need. So here is a basic outline of what the program will look like for the 2023-2024 school year.

- 1. We will be starting a food pantry for John Marshall children and their families. The Blessings That Give Hope program will be the main supporter of this food pantry. We will be providing family friendly meals, snacks, breakfast items, etc., along with personal care items such as body wash, shampoo, deodorant, etc. These items will be available for students and families on an as needed basis through the social worker. John Marshall receives Blessings In A Backpack, so they are able to provide all the weekend food bags that are needed for the school allowing us to focus our time and resources on the food pantry!
- 2. We will be collecting one food item and one personal care item each month from August - April of each school year to help keep the shelves stocked! Watch for items-of-the-month in the Progress and bulletins. These items can be dropped off in the bins labeled with that item in the narthex on the donation wall! We will also continue to collect monetary donations so that we can fill in other items that are needed.
- 3. Also, there are some other items that are needed at the school that we are looking for help in providing for them. These items may be new or gently used. (Nothing with holes, stains, etc., please.) These items can be dropped off any time in the collection bins in the narthex on the donations wall.

Heavy winter gloves/mittens (no thin ones) boys and girls

- 4. We will continue to provide a monetary donation to John Marshall so that children in need can purchase items for their family at the schools Winter Wish Store during the holiday season. This has been a huge success and appreciated so much by the students and staff!
- 5. We will start the year providing snacks for each classroom to have on hand for those students that come to school without a snack for the day. Blessings In A Backpack will be the main provider for these snacks for the rest of the year. However, they will be in contact if more help is needed in this area!
- 6. We have provided gift cards to Walmart on an as needed basis for families that are in need of more support for groceries or other essentials. These families go through the social worker and then an email request comes to us from her letting us know that there is a family in more need that what the regular programs are providing. We then purchase a Walmart gift card and the social worker passes it on to the family. We have done this before and will continue to do so on an as needed basis.

We are truly excited that Blessings That Give Hope has provided some much needed support for John Marshall families and will now take on an even greater and new area of support for their students and families. We truly appreciate all of your continued support, prayers and donations so that we can continue to serve John Marshall and accomplish the mission that we set out to do so many years ago! MINUTES REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING August 8th, 2023 Unapproved

PRESENT IN PERSON: President Shirley Ecker, Vice President Jeanette Carlson, Secretary Jenni Zaitz, Treasurer Charles Freiberg, Eugene Viegut, Terra Ecker, Sue Koerten, Charlene Buttner, Vicar Pat, Jim Lenselink, Pastor Andrea Fluegel and Pastor Asher O'Callaghan.

EXCUSED: Janet Williams

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: Shirley Ecker called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and Charlie Freiberg had devotions.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: (Jenni Zaitz) Minutes were reviewed from the July 11, 2023 Regular Council Meeting. A motion was made by Buttner, second by Terra Ecker to accept the minutes. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: (Charles Freiberg): Reviewed the current finances. The July financial reports do not include July 30th. July shows a loss of \$1200 but we are still up \$2700 year to date. A motion was made by Koerten, second by Lenselink to accept the Treasurers Reports. Motion carried.

VICE PRESIDENTS REPORT: (Jeanette Carlson) No report


VICARS REPORT: (Vicar Patrick Kempf) This is Vicar Pat's Last council meeting. He has accepted a call with Our Saviors -Skogdalen Churches. His last Sunday with Pilgrim will be September 3rd.



Vicar Pat asked the council to consider not paying him for the month of September but to pay his housing allowance for the month of September since he will need to keep his apartment into September. A motion was made by Freiberg to pay Vicar Pat's regular housing allowance of \$850 for the month of September, second by Carlson. Motion carried. His current contract will end on September 3rd. He expressed his appreciation of the council and community for everything they have done for him and stated that it has been a great 2 years.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Shirley Ecker) On Monday, July 31st, Shirley, Jeff and Charlene attended an informational meeting at St. Stephens's to learn more about some activities that they participate in to serve our community. They have invited Pilgrim to join them in a Community Dinner on August 20, 2023, Coats for Kids -winter gear drive and God's Work, Our Hands, Sunday on September 10, 2023. These are all very good opportunities for our congregation to get out and meet people. Good Shephard, Immanuel, and Mt. Calvary are also ready to do things together. Before creating a successful multi point parish, churches need to form a trust in each other and discover values that they both share. Once this has happened, the Executive Committees can get together to start making decisions. Sunday, September 17th, Pastor Dara will be at Pilgrim and there will be a congregational meeting after worship.

Shirley has contacted Pastor Karoline at St. Stephen's to discuss confirmation. Currently, Pilgrim



has 2 students that are interested. She is in the process of collecting a list of Lay Ministers from other churches that can help out with our services once Vicar Pat has left. Some congregations are using SAM's (Synod Authorized Ministry) to administer the sacraments when there is not a Pastor available. To become a SAM someone would complete 2 years of Lay school, a background check and received a letter from their council stating that they are trustworthy.

On August 14th our agreement with Pastor Andrea expires. Our current agreement is \$500 dollars per month for 10 hours of time. Some of the things that Pastor Andrea can help us with is: Training Lay Leaders, working with the Stewardship Committee and teaching members how to do a Bible Study. She can also be a resource for Fred when ministry teams need help. There is a link that we can use to schedule a call or meeting with her. For urgent questions we should call and leave a message. Working with Pastor Andrea online and by phone is the best option since there is no extra charge to Pilgrim for mileage. A motion was made by Terra Ecker, second by Carlson to extend Pastor Andrea's agreement for another 6 months. Motion carried. The new contract will begin on September 1st but she has agreed to cover us for the remainder of August.

Our Kurtzweil digital piano is having several problems and Delores has contacted Full Compass Systems to inquire about getting it fixed. There is an evaluation fee of \$110 and labor is \$110 per hour. Delores was told that Kurtzweil would not have parts for a model of that age. There is a chance that they could find some used parts but selection would be random and limited and they can't guarantee that it's even repairable. A motion was made by Freiberg, second by Terra Ecker to have Shirley, Fred, Delores and Norah price out a new (Continued on page 7)
