HONORING THE SAINTS

As a child, I spent many of my Sundays with my Grandparents. Sundays were days that Grandpa would take me and my two sisters to church. He and my Grandmother would pull up in the two-door red Chevy Impala. We would hop into the backseat. I can still remember the smell of the clear plastic seat covers with the little bumps that would leave dents on your legs on long trips. After church, we would be off to visit friends or relatives. Most often, we headed to Medford to visit my Aunt and Uncle, my Dad's brother and his wife. We might head to Athens to visit Great Uncle Julius. Once a year we visited grave sites, usually just before the Memorial Day holiday.

The trunk of the Chevy would be full of flowers on those Sundays. Grandma, who was an avid gardener, would arrange bouquets of flowers. Sometimes the flowers were from her garden, whichever flowers were in full bloom. Other times she would arrange silk flowers. The bouquets were always colorful and thoughtfully arranged. There might be a styrofoam cross with red roses, the kind found at the dime store in those days.

Grandma made specific bouquets

for specific "Saints." My Great-Grandmother passed away long before I was born. Her bouquet was always the largest. As we walked through the cemetery, we carefully read the grave markers to find other friends and old neighbors of my Grandparents. I have vivid memories of running through the gravestones, searching for the next one to adorn with flowers.

I don't remember when we made our first trip to the Athens cemetery. As the years went on, we visited other cemeteries too, one closer to home. My brother's gravestone has two vases attached. Grandma usually had some roses for those. That cemetery became our first stop on our annual trip to honor our Saints. Today, that is where I visit my Grandparents, my Dad and my Brother.

In the Lutheran Church we set aside a Sunday to honor All Saints. It is a day to remember all the faithful departed. All Saints Sunday honors every Christian that has gone to be with Jesus. They are not only martyrs, apostles, and named Saints, but members of our congregations, dear friends, and family members. We give thanks to God that by his mercy he receives sinners and gives us the

same hope that he gave to them: the hope of resurrection.

"All Saints Sunday begins a season in which we contemplate the hopes and fears of all creation, watching and waiting for signs of a new day dawning for all of us." according to Benjamin M. Stewart a Gordon A. Braatz Associate Professor of Worship and director of the Zygon Center for Religion and Science at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, in a *Living Lutheran* article entitled

"All Saints."

According to Rev. Dr. Philip H. Pfatteicher, professor at Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, and the Union Theological Seminary as well as a Lutheran pastor, "The beginnings of All Saints' Day are traced back to the eighth and ninth centuries. In the early eighth century, Pope Gregory III is said to have dedicated the St. Peter Cathedral in Rome in honor of all the saints on November 1st. A century later, Pope Gregory IV standardized the Feast of All Saints, thus

expanding the practice of commemorating all the saints on this day."

Take time this November to honor the Saints in your own way. Remember with love and fond memories those who have gone to meet Jesus before us. Give thanks to God for having blessed us with sharing their lives, no matter how brief a time, knowing that we will meet again.



Spiritually, Christians live with the hope and expectation of grace. We believe in forgiveness from God for our sins and forgiveness from others that can free us from often painful pasts. We also acknowledge the gift we give to others when we forgive them for ways in which they have hurt us. Our faith gives us a sense of peace and grounding; we are not alone in our journey through life.

This is a very impressive list of things we can remain thankful for when it feels like the world is falling apart around us. REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING October 14, 2025 Not Yet Approved

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER:

Jean Trempe called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Linda Konkel led the devotion titled "Strong Spiritual Shoes" based on Ephesians 6:15. The devotion emphasized our wearing the correct footwear for our journey with God.

SECRETARY'S REPORT:

(Linda Konkel) Motion by Sue Koerten and seconded by Charlie Freiberg to accept the September 21, 2025, meeting minutes. Motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

(Charlie Freiberg) Reviewed financial reports for September 2025. Cash in the banks totaled \$85,108 with \$15,450 held in restricted funds. Again, the largest portion of the restricted funds are Blessings that Give Hope of \$9,313. Our long-term debt stands at \$54.479. A reminder that the church's real estate is not included on the balance sheet. Expenses were a little higher this month as the final payment on the two furnaces was made. Our current level of giving is staying on track. Motion by Jim Lenselink and seconded by Frank Koerten to approve the Treasurer's Report. Motion passed.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Jean

Trempe) Jean was happy with the turnout for the town hall meeting held on Sunday. Discussion on the creation of "Work Groups" for the next step in the merger. Suggestions of Pilgrims to be members of these separate groups. Jean will make a few calls asking for volunteers for the groups. These work groups will work alongside the St. Stephen's groups to begin the progress of forming the new church organizational body and work through all the necessary legal and other issues that need to be taken care of for merging the two church families.

The Quilter's have been invited to visit St. Stephen on October 16 at 9:30 for a meet and greet. The groups would like to start to get to know each other using their common interests in quilt making for LWR and other organizations.

Jean received some information on Bell Choir online training. She will be forwarding it to St. Stephen as our bell choir is no longer active.

The Budget Committee usually begins its work in October, so the proposed budget is completed for approval by the December council meeting. It was determined that the proposed budget be only for the first quarter of 2026. Charlie Freiberg, Frank Koerten and Jim Lenselink will get together after the October 26th Joint Congregational Meeting and start getting the proposed budget completed. They have tentatively set up the period from November 11 to November 20 to work on this.

The Marty Bus is looking for specific donations. Jean will have Fred send out an e-mail with the list of items that are needed.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Frank Koerten) No Report.

BUILDING & GROUNDS RE-

PORT: (Jim Lenselink) The area in the choir loft that needed repair has been done. Precision Drywall completed the necessary repair, and Jim is in the process of trying to match the paint so that he can get it painted. He is happy with how well the repair was done. The raking and hauling of the pine needles alongside the parking lot was done this past week. The furnace door located in the Narthex has also been repaired. The winter change over for the windows needs to be done yet this fall.

WORSHIP REPORT: (Sue Koerten) Plans are being made for the October 26th Joint Congregational Retreat. The Stephen's Angels will be having a basket auction. The baskets will be on display before the joint service. The service will be at 9:00 with Pastor Dara Clifford presiding. After the service there will be a coffee hour and final auction basket time until 11:00. The first part (one hour) of the retreat will begin at 11:00, followed by a catered meal. The final hour will begin around 1:00 with a planned end time of 2:00. Plans are being made to have readers and communion assistants from both congregations for this service. Communion will be by intinction (not at the rail). A cantor to help lead the congregation in singing liturgy will be added. The Choir will be singing at this service.

A volunteer is needed to help light candles and toll a bell for All Saints Sunday, November 2, at Pilgrim.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT: No report.

BLESSINGS THAT GIVE HOPE:

No report but a large purchase was made prior to school starting with assorted items needed for the schoolchildren.

St. Stephen and Pilgrim Transition Team Meeting October 21, 2025

Present at meeting: Charlie Freiberg, Dick Holster, Jean Trempe, Jeff Kessel, Pr Karoline Schwantes, Sarah Lonsdorf, Verlyn Oelke

Pr Karoline started the meeting with a prayer.

Pr Karoline has started to read

the book: *Embracing God's Future Without Forgetting the Past.* She recommends that all of us read this book. This was discussed and copies will be ordered.

Review and finalization of plans for the joint congregational retreat at St. Stephen on 10/26.

Numerous details were reviewed and finalized. These included the meal menu, setting up for the meal, supplies for the retreat, tours during the Fellowship Hour, providing a document on the history of St. Stephen, finalizing plans with Pr Dara, the leader of the retreat, and recruiting some volunteers to help.

Verlyn, our liaison with Pr Cath Mode, discussed tentative plans for her in-person visit to Wausau. She will be here on 11/4 to start on site coaching of the merger process. She is willing to help us eliminate potential conflicts. Visit details were discussed and will be confirmed with Pr Cath.

Future Transition Team Meetings:

- We will plan to meet the first and third Tuesdays of each month.
- Everyone is OK with having some of the meetings at Pilgrim and some at St. Stephen.

WORK GROUPS and CELE-BRATION TEAM.

For this portion of the meeting, we followed the rubric of work groups and celebration team suggested by Pr Cath when she was here August 14th. Jeff Kessel passed out a document used at Pilgrim's last townhall on 10/12. This document listed proposed work groups.

At the townhall, Pilgrim members were invited to participate in the work groups. Jean, Jeff, and Charlie reported that six Pilgrim members have already agreed to join 5 work groups. Prospective members from both congregations were discussed.

A wide-ranging discussion of work groups and the celebration team ensued. The discussion included the functions and goals of each work group. The discussion resulted in our vision of the following work groups.

- Legal to look at issues such as transfer of Pilgrim property and completion of required legal paperwork.
- Constitution and Bylaws.
 This group will work to compare the constitution and bylaws of St. Stephen, Pilgrim, and the Synod model. Some elements of a new constitution and bylaws were discussed.
- Will a Mission Statement work group be needed? Mission, our purpose, will be discussed at the congregational retreat Sunday.
- Real Estate: physical plant, grounds, and maintenance.
- Real Estate: develop long term uses for Pilgrim's property.
- Finance: business plan, assets, liabilities, and budgets.
- Policies and Practices. Examples include child safe practices, wedding policies, and funeral policies. The Transition Team has already started to pull together documents from both congregations for review.

- Communications. The aim is to provide consistent communication at both churches. Before the merger communications will be internal. As the merger nears there will be a need for external communication. For example, we will need to notify the Southeast Side neighborhood group, an active supporter of the Blessings That Give Hope ministry, of the merger.
- It was suggested that this work group create a logo for our new congregation.
- Worship. It was acknowledged that our joint worship team has already met and done a lot of work to bring our two congregations together.
 A new work group may not be necessary.
- Ministry which includes outreach, education, and evangelism. This group will coordinate various ministries which might involve looking at the structure of these ministries.
- Outreach was discussed in detail. How will Good Stewards, the Angels, and Pilgrim's Church and Society group work together to continue all our ministries (The Marty Bus, community dinners, hygiene drives, Conditional Release, Coats for Kids, Lutheran World Relief kits, Blessings That Give Hope, etc.)?
- This work group will be discussed with Pr Cath when she is here next month.
- Celebration Team. Given the work and planning already done by our joint worship team, one idea presented is that the joint worship team appoint and recruit members for the Celebration Team.

Discussion points during the meeting:

- It was agreed that our aim is to merge between now and Easter.
- Dick reported that changes in the St. Stephen bulletin format have started. Specifically, readings and the Psalms will be printed in the bulletin.
- We agreed to publish Transition Team Minutes in our bulletins and monthly newsletters.
- At the retreat Sunday we are encouraged to ask people: where do you see us going?
- At the retreat invite people to participate in the process.

Next Meeting: November 4th at St. Stephen.

We concluded with The Lord's Prayer.

Welcome Sue!

Pr. Cath Mode's email of 10/6 to Jeff, Verlyn, and Pr Karoline.

Pr. Cath received the minutes from the last team meeting. She commented on several topics. Pr Karoline read the email to the Transition Team.

- She stated that "clearly you are moving along and it appears that there is energy to accomplish the tasks ahead. Good for you."
- She asked, "what are your needs for a coach?" She mentioned some things to keep in mind about coaching. Her list was discussed, and it was decided to contract with her for coaching. Some specific parameters were discussed. Verlyn, the team member designated to communicate with Pr Cath, will contact her to start the process.
- There have been technical problems with a contract for Pr Cath. The problems were discussed. Pr Karoline will get the contract to her.

The congregational retreat scheduled for 10/26.

Planning for the retreat was discussed.

- Timetable: On 10/26 Worship will start at 9:00 AM. The Angels will host the fellowship hour after the service. The retreat will start at 11:00 AM. There will be a break for lunch, and the retreat will resume after that.
- · The focus of the retreat will

be on Mission and Vision with discussion of priorities and intention.

There was a detailed discussion of aspects of the retreat, including the meal. Some tasks were assigned and help in certain tasks will be recruited.

Dick talked about legal and property issues.

- He is waiting for a response from Ruder Ware law firm
- He has had contact with a Marathon Bank officer regarding property issues.
- Options were discussed. In other words, there are lots of things to look at.
- "Let's take our time to do it right."

St. Stephen's Constitution and Pilgrim's Constitution

Verlyn has noted differences in the two constitutions. Also, it was noted that there have been revisions to both. More research will be done.

joint service at Pilgrim on the days when the choir sings at Pilgrim. One service being considered is a brunch church on 12/28.

 How do we get "shy Pilgrims" to get to know St. Stephen better? It was suggested that St. Stephen members could give tours during the fellowship hour on the 26th. Jean will put up a sign-up sheet at Pilgrim to gauge interest.

Next Meeting: 3:00 PM Oct. 21st at St. Stephen.

- Pilgrim and St. Stephen should bring a list of necessary work groups.
- Pilgrim and St. Stephen should bring a list of people that they would recommend for each work group along with a list of people who have volunteered.
