THE WAY FORWARD

It has been several years since Pilgrim last had a Pastor that we called our own. Worship services remain consistent with the help of lay ministers, interns and wonderful supply pastors to this point. Music still adds to the strength of worship. The congregation has continued to share their talents and treasures. We have a strong group of active members. Pilgrim remains financially sound. But we see fewer families in the pews on any given Sunday and fewer folks willing to volunteer. We see the congregation aging with fewer young families. Other congregations have also seen these changes over the past 10 years or more. Our challenge is how do we impact this to continue God's work?

It has been nearly a year and a half ago since Pilgrim formed a transition team and entered into discussions with St. Stephen and Good Shepherd Lutheran Churches to explore the possibility of consolidation of some form. On the surface it would appear that not much progress has been made. But much ground work has been laid. The most recent examples are the shared Lenten worship services starting with Ash Wednesday held at Pilgrim, Wednesday Lenten worship and soup suppers held at Good Shepherd and the shared Holy Week services at Good Shepherd and St. Stephen. There were also sev-

eral opportunities to attend an Easter worship service at any one of the three churches. Much effort was involved by many people. Thank you to all of the folks involved with worship preparation, preparing the delicious soups, those who set up facilities, the administrative staff who published the schedules and the choirs and musicians for the long hours of practices. Hopefully most Pilgrims took part in some of these services and have impressions to share.

At a recent meeting of our combined transition teams, referred to as GPS, (Good Shepherd, Pilgrim, St. Stephen) the group concluded that we are still in an exploratory stage focused on shared ministry. It was determined that our next course of action was to have candid conversations with our congregations to help discern our next steps.

At the April 12 town hall meeting Jeff Kessel presented some questions for the members of the congregation to consider related to the concerns and challenges of consolidation. The idea is to collect these concerns and challenges and work on addressing them. If you have not already done so, please complete the short questionnaire and return it to Jeff Kessel or turn it into the church office.

One question that each congregation needs to wrestle with is how willing are

we to leave our facility in favor of worshiping at another one of the churches. To this point, congregational feedback leads the GPS group to believe that none of the three churches membership is eager to leave our church homes. **This needs validation. We need your input.** Each church has unique facilities, some with higher maintenance and debt than others. Each church has a different atmosphere, sense of family and fellowship. Each church has a different culture of welcoming and friendliness. Each church worships in a slightly different manner, has different governance structure and financial situations. Each church has some differing charitable priorities. Even the music choices differ today ranging from more contemporary to traditional. However, the goal of serving God and spreading the Good News of Jesus’ death and resurrection for our sake is the core of the work of each congregation.

So where do we go from here? Here is a sample of the scenarios that the combined GPS group has discussed. **This list is not all inclusive.**

- Remain 3 separate congregations while continuing to seek opportunities for shared ministry
- 2 of the congregations consolidate while one remains autonomous
- Form a multipoint parish with shared pastoral leadership, with each congregation

retaining a council, identity and autonomy, perhaps forming a shared council.

- Draft a shared Pastoral Leadership agreement between two or three of the churches while each church remains autonomous. (Note: Today, St. Stephen is the only church of the three to have a rostered Pastor on staff.)
- Forming a single consolidated congregation with one council and shared pastoral leadership. This could be at one site, two sites or all three.

In most of these scenarios a shared mission and vision is required. Pilgrim may also have an option to once again work with a Pastoral Intern. However, Pastors and interns are in short supply.

What is God willing us to do? What are your thoughts on Pilgrim’s direction? Do you have some other options to add to this list? Are there options on this list that you think deserve more focus? Over the course of the next few months, Pilgrim’s transition team will seek your input on these important questions. **These are Pilgrim Family decisions, and we need your input and prayers for guidance.** Pilgrim’s transition team is made up of Chairperson, Jeff Kessel, Karen Larson, Stephen Mode, Frank Koerten, Charlie Freiberg and myself. **Please contact any one of us on the Transition Team and look for upcoming meetings.**

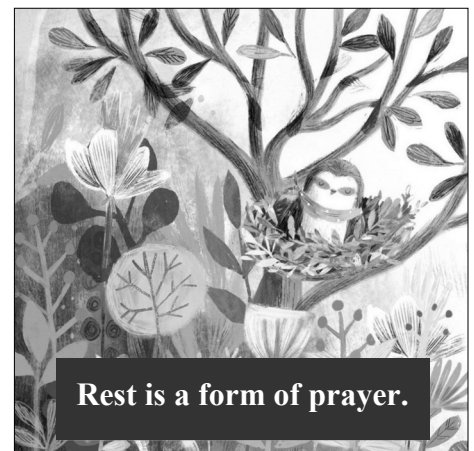

MINUTES

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING

April 8th, 2025
Unapproved

PRESENT IN PERSON: Jean Trempe (President), Frank Koerten (Vice President), Charlie Freiberg (Treasurer), Linda Konkell (Secretary), Sue Koerten (Worship Chair), Jim Lenselink (Stewardship Chair), Charlene Buttner (Church & Society Chair), Janet Williams (Life & Growth Chair).

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER:

Jean Trempe called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Frank Koerten led devotions. The devotion was from Portals of Prayer. The devotion was based on Chapter 23, Verse 34 of Luke, "Father forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."

SECRETARY'S REPORT: (Linda Konkell) Motion by Jim Lenselink seconded by Charlie Freiburg to accept the Secretary's report as presented.

TREASURER'S REPORT: (Charlie Freiberg) Reviewed financial reports for March 2025. Cash in the bank totals \$83,481, with \$26,808 held in restricted funds. Again, the largest portion of the restricted funds are for Blessings that Give Hope of \$12,723. Our long-term debt stands at \$58,593. The church equity stands at \$23,939 not including real estate. Expenses are in line with prior months. Pledges for the furnace fund have begun to come in. Motion by Frank Koerten seconded by Charlene Buttner to accept the Treasurer's report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Due to the resignation of Kay Palmer, Jim Lenselink has agreed to step into the Buildings & Grounds Position leaving the Stewardship position currently vacant. A motion to accept Jim's move to the Building and Grounds position was made and seconded. Motion carried.

The Council Presidents' Meeting was cancelled in April. Next meeting will be May 15 at St. Stephen.

Pilgrim Rummage/Bake Sale will be May 15-17. The Southeast Side Group has added Pilgrim as a participant in their annual rummage sale on

their Facebook page.

Nothing new is going on with the Intern Pastor search. Jean does have a group of volunteers to serve on the Internship Committee when the time comes.

The council will be meeting with Pastor Dara and Pastor Asher on April 26. The meeting will be a "check in" on how things are going with the "Working Better Together" process. They will also be meeting with the other two churches individually on the same day.

The Social Concerns Teams from all three churches will be meeting on May 5th to discuss ways to serve the Wausau Area more effectively.

TRANSITION TEAM REPORT: Jean Trempe reminded everyone that April 12th will be the next Town Hall meeting after worship. The Task Force group has created a questionnaire. It is important for Pilgrims to fill out the questionnaire as it pertains to concerns and challenges Pilgrims see with the consolidation process.

BLESSINGS THAT GIVE HOPE:

(Jeff Kessel VIA E-mail) The need for snacks and other items for the pantries at John Marshall and Horace Mann did not end when the new year started.

So far in 2025 Blessings That Give Hope (BTGH) has delivered over 500 snack and quick meal items to Horace Mann. In addition, BTGH provided 25 boxes of cereal for 25 Horace Mann students to take home; Peyton's Promise gave a coupon for a gallon of milk to each student who got a box of cereal. Over 400 snacks, quick meal items, and drink packets were delivered to John Marshall. BTGH has also donated socks, leggings, ski shirts, and stocking caps to the schools.

The list of April needs are as follows: individual bowls of macaroni and cheese, single serving boxes of cereal, granola bars without nuts, canned fruit, classroom snacks without nuts, shampoo, and conditioner (for Horace Mann kids), and beef sticks. You can drop off donations at Pilgrim. Office hours are Monday-Thursday: 8-12 and 1-3. If you would like someone to pick up your donations, call Jeff Kessel at 715-675-4271.

BUILDING & GROUNDS REPORT:

(Jim Lenselink) The new custodian (Shelby Brod) is doing an excellent job. He has heard many good comments on the work she is doing.

The Furnace Fund pledges are beginning to come in. Jim called the four different contractors to check on how long they would honor their quotes and if they would allow us to purchase them in different quantities. Discussion followed as to the development of a replacement plan for the four furnaces. Motion by Frank Koerten and seconded by Charlene Buttner to have the four furnaces in question all inspected and replace the worst two as recommended by the contractor as soon as possible.

The council members did a partial cleaning of Fellowship Hall/Kitchen in March. There is still more that should/could be done. The idea was tabled till next month as there is so much going on with Easter that no one has time to spare now.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT: Jean Trempe would like to see a membership list updated. Currently, there are members who have not either communed in the past year or made any financial contribution to Pilgrim. If or when Pilgrim would join with the other churches, we will need an updated membership list. She will discuss setting up a plan to start the process with the stewardship team members.

WORSHIP REPORT: (Sue Koerten)

The five-week Lenten worship services, focusing on our senses, will conclude this coming Wednesday, April 9, at noon and 5:30 p.m. The services have been hosted at Good Shepherd, and all churches contributed to the services and Lenten meals. The average attendance for the noon meal was 30. The average evening attendance was seventy. Thank you to all who participated!

Churches will hold Palm Sunday worship services at their home church. Pilgrim's will be at its usual 9:00 am. worship time.

Mary's Message

(From the newsletter archives, August, 2010, befitting the spirit of Mother's Day.)

The July-September devotional booklets have come into the church narthex and have rekindled an old memory...

She was a grandmother filled with life who often danced with a broom to her kitchen radio. But she also "knocked on wood", advised "Throw salt over your shoulder for good luck" and sent herself a birthday card the year that she'd received thirteen such cards in the mail.

She'd breeze in often, laughing and telling her granddaughters stories of her own childhood mischief making, use funny words like "crepe-hangers" and "reprobates", and although she wasn't what she called "churchy," she taught them a prayer in her childhood's Swiss language. Then with a cheery "Toodle-oo" she'd be off again.

She worried however, a bit about her health, a bit about dying and she even kept a dresser drawer filled with new, never worn nightgowns intended for hospital wear. It came as a surprise then, when many years later, she gave a beautiful nightdress to a visiting granddaughter even though

she had just received it for her own birthday. Reminded that her granddaughter's birthday was still two months away and she could wait awhile with gift giving, she was caught off-guard and blurted, "But you see, I won't be..."

The shocked reaction to her words changed her back into the laughing grandmother of old. "When you get to be my age you get old and forgetful and it's best to do things when you still can remember them" she joked, then walked her visitors to the door and stood outside on the porch where the cold winter wind blew her pallor back to pink and hid in the dark her blue tinged lips and swelled bandage wrapped legs. "Come see me again soon" was all she said.

She died a day and a half later, having successfully hidden the presence of death from her granddaughter. On her night stand lay a booklet of prayers and Scripture readings that her son and daughter-in-law said she had read over and over each day. From within the pages and words of that small book had come the presence and person of one who banishes all alarm and uncertainty for those who look to him for help.

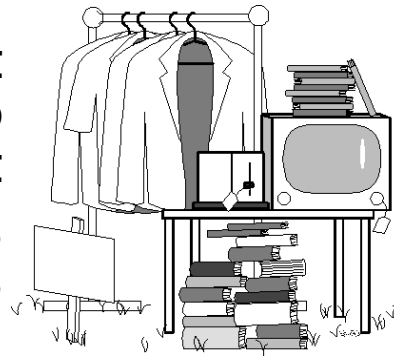
