Pilgrim started the Blessings That Give Hope ministry in the fall of 2018. The generous contributions of time and money from Pilgrims, southeast side neighbors, and others outside our neighborhood have been amazing!

Thanks to Mollie Augustine for all her many hours of work and devotion administering this ministry for six years. She has decided to step aside from this position. Delores and I have volunteered to take charge of Blessings That Give Hope. We want to continue this wonderful ministry.

When Blessings That Give Hope started John Marshall was on a waiting list for Blessings in a Backpack, a national organization that provides two weekend meals and two weekend snacks to needy students. Blessings That Give Hope provided those meals and snacks until John Marshall got into the Blessings in a Backpack program.

Over the years we've adapted and done much more. We've partnered with Peyton's Promise on food drives. We've given money to needy students to participate in John Marshall's Winter Wish Store. Blessings That Give Hope provided other items, not just food for the weekend, including at-school snacks, personal hygiene items, school supplies, and clothes. We've also started to help stock the pantry at Horace Mann.

So far, I've contacted the people who run programs at John Marshall, Horace Mann, Wausau East and Peyton's promise.

Make a joyful noise!

"If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing."

- Corinthians 13: 1-3

In this article, I am going to tell the history of a song called "O Waly Waly", also known as "The Water Is Wide", and how it has changed over the years. It dates to the 1500s when it started as a folk song about the challenges of maintaining love over time. Some of the original words are:

Love is gentle, love is kind The sweetest flower when first it's new But love grows old and waxes cold And fades away like morning dew.

It is clearly a song of lament.

As often happens, hymn writers hear a tune and have a vision for how the tune can be reused with other words. The famous hymn writer Isaac Watts, the composer of "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross", used the haunting tune of "O Waly Waly" for this beloved hymn which he composed in the late 1600s or early 1700s.

Much more recently in 1972, Hal Hopson, a professional composer and church musician, paraphrased the first three verses of I Corinthians 13 and in doing so turned the mournful message of "O Waly Waly" upside down with these words:

Though I may speak with bravest fire, And have the gift to all inspire, And have not love, my words are vain; As sounding brass, and hopeless gain.

Though I may give all I possess, And striving so my love profess, But not be give given by love within, The profit soon turns strangely thin.

Come, Spirit, come, our hearts control, Our spirits long to be made whole. Let inward love guide every deed; By this we worship and are freed.

With his new hymn, the tune is no longer haunting (at least to me); it is warm and comforting, especially the last two lines: Let inward love guide every deed; By this we worship and are freed.

New words for this beautiful tune keep cropping up. One of the songs we used this summer during the Round Robin series is to the tune of "O Waly Waly".

MINUTES

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING September 10th, 2024 Unapproved

PRESENT IN PERSON: Shirley Ecker (President), Jeanette Carlson (Vice President), Charlie Freiberg (Treasurer), Linda Konkel (Evangelism Chair), Kay Palmer (Buildings & Grounds Chair), Charlene Buttner (Church & Society Chair), Sue Koerten (Worship Chair), Janet Williams (Life & Growth Chair), Jim Lenselink (Stewardship Chair), and Terra Ecker (Children & Youth Chair).

EXCUSED: Jean Trempe (Secretary)

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: Shirley Ecker called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Devotions were led by Jim Lenselink.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: (Jean Trempe) Review of minutes from August 13, 2024, regular council meeting. A motion to accept minutes by Charlie Freiberg and seconded by Terra Ecker. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: (Charlie Freiberg) Reviewed financial reports for August 2024. Cash on hand once again exceeds the Church's debts. Cash in banks totaled \$75,898.23, with \$23,401.09 held as restricted funds. The largest portion of restricted funds is for Blessings that Give Hope of \$14,178.67. Our long-term loan stands at \$63,240.53. Contributions are on par with previous periods. Sue Koerten made a motion to accept the Treasurer's report, and it was seconded by Charlene Buttner. Motion carried.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Jeanette Carlson) No report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Shirley Ecker)

- President's Meeting Update. The council presidents did not meet in August. The next meeting of the Council president's is scheduled for Tuesday September 24 at 6:30 p.m. at Mount Calvary Lutheran Church, Rothschild.
- 2025 Portico Health Insurance
 Plan. Fred provided the council
 with the new Portico Health Insurance information. Although Fred
 has opted out of the health insurance plan after turning 65 this
 year, the church is still required to select a plan. Fred still participates

in the retirement plan, disability program, and life insurance program through Portico, and he must waive the health insurance coverage every year now that he has an independent supplemental insurance plan. If the church were to hire someone and provide health insurance, in the past we have selected the Gold Plan. The deadline for selection/submitted to Portico is October 14th. Charlie Freiberg made a motion to continue with the Portico Gold plan, and it was seconded by Terra Ecker. Motion carried. Charlie Freiberg made a motion to contribute \$50 per month towards Portico benefit coverage for Fred, and it was seconded by Sue Koerten. Motion carried.

- · A Retreat for Tired Lay Leaders October 11-12, 2024, at Waypost Camp in Hatley, WI. The rostered staff of the Wisconsin River Valley Conference would like to encourage the lay leaders of the churches to participate in the retreat. The retreat will be led by Pastor Tammy Barthels, retired, spiritual director, and retreat facilitator will lead the lay leaders in spiritual practices. Pastor Rich Block, retired, coach, and retreat facilitator will lead the lay leaders in exercises in leadership. The cost is \$100 per person for housing and three meals. The council has approved Shirley Ecker, Jeanette Carlson, and Terra Ecker to attend the retreat. Janet Williams stated funds for the retreat will come from the scrip fund. Charlie Freiberg made a motion to send Shirley Ecker, Jeanette Carlson, and Terra Ecker to the retreat with the cost being paid from the Scrip fund, and it was seconded by Charlene Buttner. Motion carried.
- Shirley spoke with Pastor Tim Coltvet, Luther Seminary on availability of interns. Pastor Tim stated most seminarians are 'second career' pastors and have a family. homes, and etc. so therefore they are looking at churches that are geographically located near their homes and families for their internship. He did suggest we complete the applications for an intern from Luther Seminary, Wartburg Seminary, and the Lutheran Theological College in Chicago, IL and submit them. He suggests I write a letter to Bishop Anne Albright-Edison that Pilgrim is looking for an intern. She meets with the other Bishops

- of the ELCA, and they may know of an intern interested in our area. We will start to work on the internship applications, and I will write to Bishop Anne. Continue to pray for the way God is leading Pilgrim.
- Pilgrim, St. Stephen, Good Shepherd, Mount Calvary, and Bethlehem Lutheran participated in God's Work Our Hands on September 8 serving lunch to the unhoused by the Marty Bus. We roughly served 50 unhoused people and 20 volunteers. Mount Calvary provided clothes from their Clothing Closet, Good Shepherd and Bethlehem provided personal hygiene products for the people to take, St. Stephen's provided the meat, beverages, and other items for the meal. Randy and Chris Ecker provided the grill and made the brats and hamburgers to serve. Everyone was very appreciative of the meal. We will be working with St. Stephen on Sunday October 27 to provide a community dinner at First Presbyterian Church. More information to come.

The small group discussed the questions:

- 1. Would our congregations be better together rather than remaining separate?
- 2. Could we accomplish more together than we can separately?
- 3. Would our community be better served if we join together?
- 4. Could the kingdom of God be further enlarged by working together?
- 5. What do we see as possible barriers in joining together?

The group came together to discuss the highlights of the discussions. It appears that though we all may be on the same page of "Better Together", we are beginning to define what that looks like, at present it may be that each member of the transition team has an idea of what "Better Together" looks like. As opposed to a collective vision. Pilgrim is doing okay at present. We have settled into the mode of the supply and lay ministers leading us through the services. We are doing okay financially. But the charge from our last Annual Meeting was to explore the potential of joining forces with other churches to see if there would be some synergy there. The Transition Task Force is considering options for the future. Nothing has been decided yet. No decisions have been made. We are starting down the path of exploration! The Transition Task Force will keep the Church Council and the congregation as a whole informed of the steps being taken.

Nine prayer shawls were taken to God's work Our hands on September 8 for the unhoused to take. Marty bus needs volunteers. St. Stephen's is collecting coats until the end of October for children, teens, and adults.

LIFE AND GROWTH (Janet Williams) We are no longer able to have an Election Day Bake Sale due to a conflict with the County and Religious organizations using County Facilities. There is a Southeast Side event happening at the Airport on Saturday, October 5 from 10 to 3. There is a \$10 vendor fee plus a contribution to the Silent Auction. Should we have a bake sale at this event? There is money in the tractor fund (which we do not need), rummage sale funds and bake sale funds to pay some of the cost for the new tables and chairs. We should use scrip card funds to pay the remaining balance for the new chairs and tables, about \$895. Need a motion to use scrip card funds to pay the remaining balance due. A motion was made by Sue Koerten to use scrip card funds to pay for the remaining balance of the furniture costs. Motion seconded by Charlene Buttner. Motion carried. The scrip card program is ongoing. Cards are ordered about every two weeks. Orders can be placed with Fred at the church office or Janet Williams (715) 573-3310. It has been taking about five days to receive the cards once the order has been placed. Current balance in scrip card fund is \$7,351.


