### ...from Pat Kempf, Vicar

Greetings Good People of Pilgrim and Happy New Year!

Have you made a resolution yet? Don't. Did you know only 40-50% of Americans make one, and of those, less than 10% feel like they followed through? Sounds like a whole lot of disappointment and failure, doesn't it?

Humans have a really hard time adhering to things they didn't decide to do themselves. While a New Year's resolution seems like a personal choice, in the back of our minds, we know we only made it because of the time of year. We're setting ourselves up to fail. And there's more to it than just a dime's worth of psychology.

Maybe I sound like a broken record, but we live in a system that keeps us on the go and effectively punishes down time and true rest. Many of us have internalized that and keep ourselves busy even in our down time. With all the various societal factors keeping us occupied, additional tasks, chores, or commitments on top, easily slide off in favor of known quantities.

### Make a joyful noise!

"In the bleak midwinter, frosty wind made moan, earth stood hard as iron, water like a stone; snow had fallen, snow on snow, snow on snow, in the bleak midwinter, long ago."

- "In the Bleak Midwinter" Christmas carol (verse 1) words by Georgina Rossetti

It may seem odd that a column about hope should have such a serious verse as its introduction but the song goes on to speak of a future built on hope. At first glance the verse above gives an excellent description of what our world in the Upper Midwest looks and feels like this time of year. Right now our earth stands "hard as iron" and water in our lakes and streams is "like a stone". But the story doesn't end here.

We are still in the Christmas season where we celebrate the birth of Jesus, our savior and the hope of the world. We have been singing some of our favorite hymns, "Oh, Little Town of Bethlehem," "Away in a Manger," "Silent Night," "Joy to the World," and the list goes on. Many of us have favorite Christmas hymns and I'm sure many of us have personal stories attached to them. All these hymns and events are so familiar to us they can seem like clichés. But they keep appearing, familiar and yet new every season. They help teach us the reasons for Christian hope.

Of course there are other things that give us hope as well. We are familiar with spring when the earth softens and water runs freely, where plants can thrive and grow, where animals emerge from hibernation. We are fortunate to see very dramatically the hope that comes each year in the spring.

There are other signs of hope, also, some unique to the circumstances in which we find the world in early 2022, many of them occurring right around us. Some dramatic, some much more modest.

- There are plans to paint and spruce up Fellowship Hall. Who knows where that can lead us?
- In Downtown Wausau there are several huge murals, created by area residents, which show paths out of addiction and abuse into health and safety.
- Pilgrim's support for the people on conditional release continues to be supported at a very high level.
- Each week a group of Pilgrim members meets to pray for people. During the height of the COVID lockdown they weren't able to meet face to face but they continued to pray at their homes; now they are able to meet face to face. They have become a support group, not only for the people for whom they pray but also for each other.

These and MANY other examples are tangible examples of hope. The song mentioned in the introduction to this column ends this way: What can I give him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd I would bring a lamb; if I were a wise man I would do my part; yet what I can I give him—give my heart.

With thanks for Pilgrims and for members of our community who show by their actions the many ways through which they give examples of hope through their love and service to God and to each other.



### **MINUTES**

# REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING December 14, 2021 (Unapproved)

PRESENT IN PERSON: President Jean Trempe, Vice President Shirley Ecker, Secretary Jenni Zaitz, Treasurer Charlie Freiberg, Jeanne Wunsch, Eugene Viegut, Charlene Buttner, Sue Koerten, Vicar Pat and Jeff Kessel.

**EXCUSED:** Janet Williams

MEETING CALLED TO OR-DER: Jean Trempe called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and she had devotions.

COVID 19 UPDATE: (Jeff Kessel) An updated COVID document was presented to the council with some updated facts and recommendations for the Christmas Eve service. Here are some current statistics for Marathon County:

- On 12/02/21 there were 252 peoples diagnosed with COVID in Marathon County. The last time there were as many confirmed cases was 11/15/2020 when there were 258 cases.
- In the week ending 11/27/21 there were 38 new hospital admissions of people with COVID in our county. The last time there were as many hospitalizations for COVID was the week ending 11/21/2020 when there were 46 new hospitalizations.
- To date there have been 284 deaths in Marathon County caused by COVID.
- As of 12/3/21, only 52.1% of Marathon County residents have completed the vaccine series. This percentage is nowhere near where it needs to be to get us to herd immunity. This means that even though

80.6% of Marathon County residents over 65 years of age have completed the vaccine series, this age group and all vaccinated people, will still be at increased risk for breakthrough COVID infections.

#### Christmas Eve Recommendations:

- Continue to strongly encourage face mask use for everyone over 2 years of age before, during, and after our Christmas Eve service.
- In mid December send out emails and letters to the congregation reminding the Pilgrim family of our face mask and physical distancing policies.
- Allow people to sit every other row.
- Consider having two Christmas Eve services.
- People need to preregister for our Christmas Eve service.
- Leave some room for walk-ins.
- Continue to document where people sit.

The numbers were reviewed from previous years, in 2015-153 people attended, 2016-118 people attended, 2017-144 people attended, 2018-148 people attended, 2019-133 people attended and 2020 the outdoor service had 45 outdoor and 19 on You Tube. We currently have 20-30 people in attendance at the Sunday morning services. It was decided that we would have one service with people sitting every other pew. The wings and balcony will be used as needed. There will be a form at the end of each pew for people to record their name and phone number, to be used if we need to contact someone after the service. Masks will be strongly suggested. We will have a welcome message prior to the service to welcome those attending by zoom. The Christmas

morning service will not be recorded, this will give Fred the day off. The New Years week-end recording will be done by Chris or Jeff to relieve Fred and give him the week -end off.

VICARS REPORT: (Vicar Patrick Kempf) Vicar Pat has met with all home bound worshipers. He went to visit the Boehm's with Karen Larsen last week. Next week he has a meeting with some prospective new members. Starting the end of January or beginning of February he will begin leading a monthly worship service at care facilities. The Confirmation class wrapped up their 1st semester by decorating the tree in the sanctuary. Vicar has been discussing the youth gathering with the girls, they are both eligible to go. He has been working on his project. It will involve a study of what other religions believe. He would like to have some guest speaks such as the Rabbi from the local Synagogue.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: (Jenni Zaitz) Minutes were reviewed from the November 9, 2021 Regular Council Meeting. Motion to accept the minutes by Koerten, Second by Buttner. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: (Charlie Freiberg): Reviewed the Income and Expense Statement, Accounts Payable, Check Register and Balance Sheet. We had normal expenses and a balance of -\$2000 at the end of November. We are hoping for a strong December. We do have funds available if they are needed. The Thanksgiving Benevolence was up this year. A motion was made by Wunsch, second by Ecker to accept the Treasurers Report. Motion carried.

VICE PRESIDENTS REPORT: (Shirley Ecker) Went over the 2022 Budget Draft. A motion was made Koerten, second by Wunsch to give Fred a 3% raise in pay. Motion Carried. A motion was made by

Buttner, second by Koerten to give Dennis a 3% raise in pay. Motion carried. A motion was made by Eugene, second by Wunsch to approve the budget with salary changes. Motion Carried.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Jean Trempe) The nomination committee has presented the following nominees: Children and Youth-Barb Yeast. Vice President-Jeanette Carlson, Stewardship-Jim Lenselink, President-Shirley Ecker, Homme Home Representative-Jeff Kessel and Mission Endowment-Larry Brandenberg. Jean has reached out to Jeanette and Chad to help again with the audit. The meeting with the executive committees and Associate Bishop Grant scheduled for December 9<sup>th</sup> was canceled due to weather concerns and rescheduled for Tuesday, January 4. The annual meeting will be held January 30th and agenda's were sent to council members. A meeting will be set up with the Executive Committee and Vicar Pat to discuss his request for a schedule change. Possible changes to the Bylaws will be deferred until the new council is in place and we understand our direction of pastoral leadership. Progress articles are due December 20, 2021.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE RE-PORT: (Sue Koerten) No report.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS TEAM: (Eugene Viegut) The snow shoveling crew is now set up for winter. Dennis had to purchase a new vacuum cleaner. The cost to paint the Fellowship Hall will be \$150.00 to \$350.00 for the paint and \$900.00 to \$1500.00 for labor. A motion was made by Freiberg, second by Koerten to paint the Fellowship Hall this winter. Motion Carried.

EVANGELISM: (Jeanne Wunsch) Christmas Cards containing a Gift Card will be sent to all Sunday School students. Gift cards are being donated to the Food Pantries at Wausau East and Wausau West High Schools. Care packages are being put together to send to the college students at the end of January.

BLESSINGS THAT GIVE HOPE: Extra food will be sent home with participants for Christmas Break. They will also receive a \$10.00 gift card to Noodles. Each kid in the program will receive \$5.00 to spend at the John Marshall Winter Wish Store to purchase Christmas gifts for their families. Money was donated to the program by Hallman Lindsay.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY: (Charlene Buttner) Gifts for the LSS Conditional Release group were delivered. Thank you for a great response. Everyone received blankets, pillows, towels, socks, and numerous other items. Food, clothing and hygiene items were donated to Open door. Food and hygiene items were donated to The Neighbors Place. Poinsettias were delivered to our home bound members.

LIFE & GROWTH: (Janet Williams) The annual Chili Supper was held on Tuesday, November

23, special thanks to Vicar Pat for making the chili.
