
GOD MOMENTS

As I lay on the concrete driveway from my fall on my head, legs sprawled across the planters, not knowing how bad this was, I opened my eyes and saw my sparrow friends all lined up on the edge of the roof, all quietly staring down at me. God has always spoken to me through the birds, so I knew His presence was with me. I lay there for some time wondering if anyone would come, and finally I heard what sounded like a leash, giving me hope that a dog-walker was nearing. I was able to raise one arm a bit, and said "please help me" in a low voice, which got the dog staring and barking, which caused the walker to stop. I hoped she would not be a person who didn't want to get involved, but she stopped, stared, came closer, tied her dog to the tree, and asked if I had a phone she could use. I did. I had brought it to the garage that morning, anticipating a call from one of John's nurses. She said "I will be calling 911, as there is a lot of blood." After her call, she asked if there was anyone she could contact. I said my husband is in his chair in the living room. She went in and notified him there was an ambulance coming to take me to Emergency. When she came out she asked if there was anyone else she could contact, and I said if there is a red truck in the street or the driveway, to go to that house and let them know of the occurrence. Later, we found her name was Dorothy, a retired nurse. Again, God sent someone that could handle the messy situation. (She even made cookies for John.)

Dear Siblings in Christ,

I remember the beginning of winter in 2014. It was the second week of November. I was attending a retreat for clergy from the six different synods in Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula of Wisconsin. We were at Saint Anthony Spirituality Center in Marathon. Our retreat ended early so that we could all, hopefully, get home before the storm. And storm it did! Over 20+ inches of snow fell. November is a month of change. We move from the colors of autumn to the white snowflakes of winter. We also move to longer nights and cozy blankets. Our outdoor activities move indoors or we bundle up in layers.

God created winter as a time of rest and Sabbath. The trees rest from producing fruit. Animals hibernate or they only do what is necessary. "Plants and animals don't fight the winter; they don't pretend it's not happening and attempt to carry on living the same lives that they lived in the summer. They prepare. They adapt. They perform extraordinary acts of metamorphosis to get them through. Winter is a time of withdrawing from the world, maximizing scant resources, carrying out acts of brutal efficiency and vanishing from sight; but that's where the transformation occurs. Winter is not the death of the life cycle, but it's crucible" (Katherine May, "Wintering: The Power of Rest and Retreat in Difficult Times," page 14). When we take time to acknowledge and recognize winter as a season of transformation, we see God's glorious beauty.

For us, winter feels like something to survive - to get through. Winter is our bragging rights of strength and resilience. Winter feels like a season of grief and anxiety. However, for Creation, winter is a time of preparation for the new life of spring. It is a time to notice the beauty, diversity, and uniqueness of God's world. How many shades of white do you notice? How many different types of ice or snow are there? The warmth of the sun or the bitter coldness of the wind feels different than the other seasons. What else do you notice?

Working toward shared and/or collaborative ministry can feel like a long season of winter. It feels like it is just something we have to get through to survive as the Church. What happens when we shift our perspective to see this season as a time of transformation and preparation for new life? Butterflies and birds migrate this time of year, but they are also making a journey of preparation for new life. As the Church, we believe in dying and new life - death and resurrection. We need both death and resurrection. It's part of our story as Christians. We also believe that God created the seasons, which includes

winter and spring. For the Wausau area ELCA congregations it is a time of winter. A time in which we prepare, adapt, and transform into the new life God is calling us into.

Conversations, both formal and informal, are happening. Wausau area congregations are discussing ways in which they

are wintering during this time of transformation. Are they willing to change their worship time or day? What is their energy level for ministry? What are their expectations of a pastor and other staff? How do they move from a clergy-centered congregation to a ministry-centered congregation? How are members willing to adapt? How does this season

create new life and new ministry? Where is God calling you and the congregation of Pilgrim? What does dying and new life look like? How do we see the beauty in this time of wintering?

Thanks be to God for creating winter!

Dear Pilgrim Lutheran Church Council,

After a time of prayer and discernment with the East Central Synod of Wisconsin (ECSW) staff and Council President Shirley Ecker, I will no longer be the Transition Facilitator for Pilgrim Lutheran Church, effective November 30, 2023.

The agreement between Pilgrim Lutheran Church, Wausau, and Pastor Andrea Fluegel, Transition Facilitator states, "This agreement terminates on the date specified above or upon thirty days written notice from Pilgrim Lutheran Church or the Transition Facilitator, in consultation with the bishop of the synod. All financial obligations between the Transition Facilitator and the congregations will be fulfilled by or on the date of termination."

I have discerned that my skills and gifts are not a good match for Pilgrim Lutheran Church's expectations and needs at this time. The ECSW staff will be working with Shirley Ecker and the Pilgrim Council on helping find a congregational coach to work with Pilgrim during this time of Holy Conversations.

It has been a blessing to get to know the Body of Christ at Pilgrim Lutheran Church.

I will continue to hold you in my prayers.

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING November14th, 2023 Unapproved

PRESENT IN PERSON: President Shirley Ecker, Vice President Jean-ette Carlson,

Secretary Jenni Zaitz, Treasurer Charles Freiberg, Eugene Viegut, Terra Ecker, Charlene Buttner, Jim Lenselink, Sue Koerten and Janet Williams.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: Shirley Ecker called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and Jenni Zaitz had devotions.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: (Jenni Zaitz) Minutes were reviewed from the October 10, 2023 Regular Council Meeting. A motion was made by Carlson, second by Viegut to accept the minutes. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: (Charles Freiberg): Reviewed the current finances. Our revenue is a little ahead of last year. We had a \$600 gain for the month and \$300 year to date. A motion was made by Lenselink, second by Buttner to accept the Treasurers Reports. Motion carried.

VICE PRESIDENTS REPORT: (Jeanette Carlson) The Budget Committee meeting is scheduled for Thursday, November 16 th at 6:00 P.M.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Shirley Ecker) The Nominating Committee has been charged and will consist of Jean Trempe, Jeanne Wunsch, Katie Ecker and Terra Ecker. A secretary will need to be nominated as Jenni Zaitz is completing the first of a three year term. A Building and Grounds Representative will need to be nominated as Eugene Viegut is ending his second term. An Evangelism Representative is also needed due to the position remaining vacant throughout 2023. Charlene Buttner is completing her first term for Church and Society and has agreed to complete another term and Janet Williams is completing her first term for Life and Growth and has agreed to complete another term. The committee will be contacting Jeff Kessel as he will be completing his first term on the Endowment Fund Committee. Jeanette Carlson

is ending her first term as Endowment Fund Secretary and will not be returning due to health issues. Committee reports for the annual meeting will be needed soon. There were only 11 Energy Audits returned and 4 were from council members.

A motion was made by Koerten, Second by Freiberg to purchase the Clavinova 905 digital piano and to use script funds if needed to reach the total price. Motion carried.
